From the Pastor

Beloved of God,

I continually give thanks for our life together in Christ as the people of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. God is doing wonderful things among and through us. We are indeed “a congregation empowered by the Good Shepherd.”

This month we are in the midst of our pledge drive when we are each asked to prayerfully consider where God is leading us as a congregation and how we can generously share our resources. We do this, in part, so that we can better plan for our ministry together as a congregation.

Yet the main reason we as Christians commit to sharing our resources is not because the congregation needs money to do ministry together. The main reason we commit to giving is because everything we have is a gift from God to be used for the care and nurture of God’s world. We are caretakers, not owners. Giving reminds of us of this.

Giving brings us joy. Who are the most joyful people you know? I suspect they are grateful, generous people. Practicing gratitude and generosity helps us to turn away from our culture’s joy killing approach to money. Our culture tells us that we are entitled to riches, that we deserve everything money can buy, and that money should be used to increase our security and pleasure. This approach to money leaves us feeling jealous, unhappy and anxious. Giving nurtures a different way of being within us. We are freed from our fearful, selfish grip on what has been given to us and empowered for lives of gratitude and joy.

Giving changes our hearts. Jesus said “where your treasure is, there your heart will be.” We’ve taken that to mean that where our treasure is reveals where our heart will be, that we can look at our bank statements to see where our heart is. Jesus statement is more radical, that where our treasure is determines where our heart is. Our hearts and lives change based on where we put our treasure. Giving a significant portion of our treasure away shapes our hearts to be grateful and generous.

It is for these reasons that we make pledges each year. Pledging provides us each with an opportunity to practice gratitude and generosity, no matter how much or little we have. As you do this, I encourage you not to focus on the dollar amount and how you think that might compare to other givers. I encourage you to look at what percentage of your income you currently give away and challenge yourself to increase that by 1%. Pledging also helps us to make giving a priority in our budget rather than waiting to see what we have left over. It provides a way to prayerful commit to where we want our hearts to be in the year ahead.

We are empowered by the Good Shepherd to give freely. Thanks be to God.

GOOD SHEPHERD LUTHERAN CHURCH CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES - October 20, 2015 – 7:00 pm

President Jim Fritz called the meeting to order. Krista Holland offered devotions. Present: Pr. Amy, Jim Fritz, Kate Narveson, John Jefferson, Clara Knudson, Krista Holland, Drew Duffy, Matt Tapscott, Jonathon Struve and Jeri Laursen. Guest: Lyle Otte

Matt Tapscott moved, Drew Duffy seconded to approve the September minutes. Passed Matt Tapscott added an item (Welcome Friends and Neighbor Picnic) to the Evangelism report on the agenda. Kate moved to approve the agenda, John Jefferson seconded. Passed.

Jim Fritz asked that Lyle Otte give his report to the council first. Lyle, as a representative of the Social Justice Sub-Committee of the Stewardship Committee, attended to talk with the council about the Barnabus Uplift program. Their slogan is "This is not a hand out, it is a hand up." This program is for training low income people to get entry level jobs. NEICC has a CNA (Certified Nursing Aid) training program. Lyle recommend that Good Shepherd open its facility to a training class in January. This would involve six classes, M-Th, 9:00-2:45. Following discussion Matt Tapscott moved to approve this recommendation, Drew Duffy seconded. Approved. Drew Duffy then moved that we designate this year's Christmas Offering to this program, Kate Narveson seconded. Approved.

Lyle also thanked the congregation, from the Social Justice Committee, for the \$3098 support for Refugee Crisis.

Education: Krista Holland

Pr. Amy meets with the young people for confirmation every other Sunday morning following the worship service. Younger children meet separately. "Fruits of the Spirit" is the theme for this year. The intergenerational events will continue. The Christmas program is December 20.

Evangelism: Matt Tapscott

The Welcome Friends and Neighbor picnic was very successful once again. 200+ attended. There were many volunteers and many donations. More people are needed for clean-up following the picnic. New Member Sunday is October 25. Jeri Laursen moved, Jonathon Struve to approve the following new members: Kate Blair, Sara Hanssen, Claude and Harriet Hayes, Jane Jakoubek, Jim and Diane Kruse (associate), Pr. Matt (associate), Pr. Amy, Nathan and Abigail Larson, Sharon Rendack, Kristin Swanson, Kathryn Thompson, and Jaci

Wilkinson. Council approved. Matt asked that we have a line item in the 2016 budget for hard copy option of “The Lutheran”.

Property and Management: Drew Duffy

We received a landscaping donation of \$100 from John and Mary Klemish. The Landscaping Committee did a spruce up this week. The roof is done. Reg Laursen is researching the R-Value and will report to Drew. The water heaters are installed but are waiting on a thermostat. Drew checked the fire alarm system and it is working well.

Stewardship: John Jefferson

The pledge drive is underway. A new bulletin board was put up this past week. Presentations are scheduled for Sunday mornings. The Bishop will be here on November 15. A 5% increase of current pledge is being recommended and a goal of 80 pledges was set. The committee has set a November 22 deadline for returning pledges. This will allow the budget committee time to begin the 2016 budget discussion. Ministry Teams are under revision and rotation. E-Giving cards are being revised.

Worship: Jonathon Struve

The committee has approved the Advent paraments design. Barbara Berg has been commissioned to weave the paraments. Wednesday services are going well. They are looking for more volunteers to provide the supper following the service. We will use kneeling communion during Lent and Advent. The committee had a request for a recital on Sunday, November 1, 2:00. Rehearsal will be Thursday, Oct. 29. November 1 is All Saints Day Sunday and we will honor those who has been born and those who have passed away this past year.

Pastor’s Report: Pr. Amy

The Bishop will be at Good Shepherd on Sunday, November 15. The NE IA Synod assembly encourages congregations to have a special hunger appeal when the bishop or a synod staff member visits. Drew Duffy moved, John Jefferson seconded to have the appeal. Passed. Pr. Amy has been visiting shut-ins and residents in retirement homes. She has not begun the every member visit yet. Pr. Amy said we need a new wedding policy. There will be one wedding on July 16, 2016 conducted by an ELCA pastor. There was a second request for a wedding in June, 2016. After discussion Jeri Laursen moved, Drew Duffy seconded, that because we are in transition on our policy we are not in a position to offer our facility for this wedding.

President’s Report: Jim Fritz

Pr. Amy has asked for a credit card authorization for ordering on-line, continuing education registration, etc. Clara Knudson suggested a \$1500 limit and Pr. Amy will be the signing officer. Another person from the council will co-sign. John Jefferson moved, Matt Tapscott seconded to approve this request. Passed. Nominations for 2015: Kate Narveson will step in to the president’s role. A vice president will need to be found as well as treasurer. Clara Knudson is stepping down. Committees were asked to think about possible members for their particular committee. Bring nominations and budget needs to the November Council meeting.

Treasurer’s Report: Clara Knudson

We will continue to use the health insurance policy for Pr. Amy as before. Gold Plus. Portico is \$1539/month (health insurance, benefits, etc.). Drew Duffy moved and John Jefferson seconded to approve the treasurer’s report. Passed. There was no old or new business.

The meeting was adjourned and Pr. Amy offered the closing prayer.

LANDSCAPE SUBCOMMITTEE UPDATE – FROM SUMMER TO WINTER

Summer – The over-flowing, colorful entryway pots and blooming plants and shrubs in the landscape beds succumbed to a mid-October frost. On Saturday morning, October 24, twelve Luther College Student Congregation Fall Fling students, joined by Landscape Subcommittee members (Elizabeth Kaschins, Jane Kemp, Norma Refsal), Jane Jakoubek and Jerry Frank, cleared the beds and Lynette's Garden of plant waste. Jerry Frank and Reg Laursen, Property & Management Committee members, supplied the trailer and pickup truck and disposed of the waste. As has been our practice in the past, the Subcommittee contributed \$150 to the Student Congregation's designated benevolence, this year the Middle East and Europe Refugee Crisis fund through ELCA's Lutheran Disaster Response.

Fall – The entryway pots have been filled with pumpkins, gourds, and dried hydrangeas as well as evidence that 'critters' like to dig in the pots and gnaw on the 'vegetables'.

Winter – In time for the beginning the Advent season at the end of November, the fall items in the entryway pots will be replaced with natural winter greens, birch and other colorful branches, and pine cones. The grapevine wreaths will reappear on the entryway doors, wound with blue ribbons, the liturgical color for Advent.

Thank you to John and Mary Klimesh for their generous donation of a \$100 gift certificate to Pinter's to be used by the Landscaping Committee.

COMMUNICATIONS SUBCOMMITTEE NEWS

This fall, the Subcommittee has met with Pastor Amy, been in several conversations with other committees and congregation members, and reviewed the assessment and recommendations of the Communications Audit completed by Luther students last spring. As a result, guidelines for sharing the good news of what's happening at Good Shepherd as well as providing information to our members about items of interest from area churches and organizations have been created. The guidelines will no doubt be refined as we expand and evaluate the variety of sources through which we receive and provide information. A brief summary follows:

Good Shepherd Directory – The online Directory is continually updated – photos and contact information for our new members are available there. Changes in phone numbers, email addresses, and residences are entered as soon as they are received in the church office. A new version of the paper Directory that will include all additions and updates since the first version was produced, is in the process of being compiled and printed. Announcements about its availability will be forthcoming.

Good Shepherd Letterhead Stationery and Note Cards – Our letterhead has been redesigned and printed on stationery-quality paper. The letterhead and note cards, both imprinted with our logo in green ink on ivory papers, are available in the church office. Contact our Administrative Assistant, Erika, if you wish to use some of either.

Worship Bulletins and Announcement Sheets – Pastor Amy, the Worship & Music Committee, and Erika have been collaborating to design and create bulletins that are effective and readable guides to our worship services and practices. The Order of Worship, various page number designations, and some Biblical texts are clearly noted.

Good news! – The bulletins are now posted on our website under the CONNECT tab. Available there now are bulletins and announcement sheets for Wednesday and Sunday services from September 30 to the present. Jane Kemp is to be thanked for getting this long-awaited website project underway.

The separate announcement sheets are intended to provide information about events related to that worship evening or day, Good Shepherd events for the week ahead, and timely area church and organization announcements. Area organization programs and events announcements usually will be limited to those involving congregation members.

Good Shepherd's Website (www.goodshepherddecorah.org) – Several additions and upgrades have been made to our website in recent weeks. Added under the CONNECT tab are the texts of Pastor Amy's sermons, beginning with Sunday, October 18; bulletins and announcement sheets (described above); and newsletters, beginning with the October 2015 issue. The style and format of our newsletter is being reviewed, also.

Photos regularly accompany information added to our Facebook and G+ sites and most often accompany news items in our blog under the NEWS/EVENTS tab. Dustin Cote, our webmaster, recently added a Good Shepherd photo gallery using Flickr. The Facebook, G+, and Flickr logos appear on our website; our sites are linked there.

As we prepare for the pledge drive and the budgeting process I hope you'll take a moment to appreciate the great work that we all do for the greater church and those in need. While it may have seemed like the past year was all about facilities, we have a remarkable track record of benevolences of which we should all be proud!

Speaking of facilities, the Property and Management Committee have been busy again! The Fellowship Hall and the Sunday School wing now both have additional roof insulation and a brand new membrane roof! This was a long overdue maintenance item that we were able to repair in the nick of time. Soon we would have been paying to fix leaks. However, now we can enjoy many years of confidence that we have practiced good Stewardship with our facilities. You may notice that the new roofing material is white rather than the traditional black material. This is an additional energy saving device as it has been determined that white roofs reflect heat and are more efficient than the absorbent black coatings. We hope to have the new water heaters for the kitchen fully functional within the month.

Pastor Amy has been working with our youth every other Sunday morning and the kids are really enjoying their time with her. The Education and Youth/Family committees are working together to provide rich opportunities for our youth. Hopefully you've witnessed some of them being more involved in the weekly service. CONFIRMATION

Confirmation is held 10:45am on Sunday mornings as part of the Youth Sunday School Class. This year the class includes youth grades 6th-9th grade. Pastor Amy will meet with the class every other week in her office. The Sundays she is not with them they will be doing another activity together including service, discussion, and the intergenerational storytelling that will happen once a month.

Those in 8th and 9th grade wishing to publicly confirm their faith are also expected to: complete 15 sermon notes each year, assist with worship, do service within and outside the church, attend Lenten mid-week worship and meet with an adult mentor periodically during coffee hour and Lenten Soup Suppers.
