Words from Pastor Larson

Beloved of God,

“Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.” This command of Jesus, often called the Golden Rule, pertains to our whole lives including our political lives. During these contentious times, and especially during this election year, Christian leaders with a wide range of theological and political views are calling us to intentionally practice the Golden Rule in our political discourse and behavior. The social justice committee led a forum on this on Jan. 26. That forum was just the beginning of this invitation to live out the Golden Rule in this time. We will continue to focus on this challenge throughout this year.

Here is the Statement of Support for Golden Rule 2020, signed by sixteen faith leaders ranging from Baptists to National Conference of Catholic Bishops and including ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton:

“We are Christians with different theological and political views who have come together to express concern about the polarization and incivility that is tearing our country apart. We are also deeply troubled by the prospect of an angry and hateful political campaign season in 2020 that will further divide us as a nation.

We believe that we can find guidance through this national dilemma in the teachings of Jesus. In particular, we believe that Jesus’ command to “do unto others as you would have them do unto you” should be taken seriously by Christians who engage in political activity. We also believe that if enough people follow this “Golden Rule” principle, it will help generate the respect and civility we so desperately need in our country.

Churches have an important role to play in helping to heal America, and we hope and pray that local congregations will be active in efforts to increase understanding and bridge divisions in our country between now and the 2020 election. To this end, we encourage Christians of different political views to come together...to participate in Golden Rule 2020: A Call for Dignity and Respect in Politics. We invite congregations and individuals to do two things: 1) pray for the healing of the divisions in our country, and 2) promote the use of the Golden Rule in our own political discussions and election activities in 2020.”



Jesus asked "Do you want to be made well?" with the theme "Rise! Take Your Mat and Walk". You are faced with this life-changing question. What are you going to do? Use this opportunity to reflect with your WDP group, community and ecumenical partners. Prayer and action are what link us together around the globe. All are invited to attend.

Gather Magazine Bible Study Winter 2020: We are called! by Kathryn A. Kleinhans Reformer Martin Luther used the word "vocation" or "calling" to refer to all aspects of human life. We are called to respond to God not just in our personal relationship with God but in our relationships with family and friends, in our work, and in our communities. This four-part Bible study will explore stories from both the Old and New Testament. As we reflect on how our biblical forebears heard and responded to God's call, we will gain insight into how God is calling us—and how God may be calling others through us. **Session 1:** Hearing God's Call; This session focuses on men and women in the Old Testament. Some of them heard and recognized God's call clearly. Others struggled to realize that it was God who was calling them or exactly what God was calling them to do. What can we learn from their stories?
