## BELOVED OF GOD,

As we enter the season of Lent with Ash Wednesday on March 2, I wanted to share with you about our Lenten theme for this year: **Full to the Brim: An Expansive Lent.** This theme is offered by A Sanctified Art, a team of artists who create resources for congregations. The writers for the Lent series this year offer the following reflection.

"The scriptures for this Lenten season (in the Revised Common Lectionary, Year C) are filled with parables and promises of God's abundant and expansive grace. Jesus as a mother hen, a prodigal son welcomed home, a fig tree nurtured with care and hope, precious oil poured out lovingly and freely, stones shouting out with praise —these sacred texts are brimming with a gospel of grace. We've done nothing to deserve or earn this grace, and yet, like water, it spills over. *Full to the Brim* is an invitation—into a radically different Lent, into a full



life. It's an invitation to be authentically who you are, to counter scarcity and injustice at every turn, to pour out even more grace wherever it is needed. It disrupts the scarcity mentality that capitalism, oppression, or hierarchy can plant inside of us. When we allow ourselves to be filled to the brim with God's lavish love, that love spills over. It reaches beyond ourselves; like water, it rushes and flows, touching everything in its path.

We recognize that traditional iterations of Lent often emphasize restraint, confession, and piety. The origins of Lent were that one was to leave their old life behind to fast and prepare to be baptized into a new way of living. In essence, this was a practice of stepping away from the rat race, corrupt power, scarcity mentality, and empty rituals in order to live a more expansive and full life of faith. And so, Full to the Brim trusts the promise of our baptisms—God has already claimed us as God's own and nothing we can do will ever change or erase that.

Full to the Brim doesn't ignore or deny sin and suffering. It doesn't absolve accountability for wrongdoing. Instead, it contextualizes our faith. If love is our beginning, how can we live our lives led by love's promises? It reminds us to live fully—as we pursue justice and hope, or express grief and gratitude. And so, this Lent, let us trust—fully—that we belong to God. Let us increase our capacity to receive and give grace. Let us discover the expansive life God dreams for us."

**7:00 pm:** Full worship service with Holy Communion and Imposition of Ashes.

# The Lent Evening Prayer Services: Wednesdays 6:15pm March 9-April 6 - Holden Evening Prayer, "Lord, Teach us to Pray"


These services will turn us toward God's abundance in prayer. We'll explore our questions about prayer in conversation with Martin Luther's wisdom about the Lord's Prayer. **On Maundy Thursday, April 14, 7pm,** we will share in Holy Communion, a First Communion milestone for some Good Shepherd youth, and Stripping of the Altar.

**On Good Friday, April 15, 7 pm** we will share in jazz worship and reflect upon the connections between lynching in modern times and crucifixion in Jesus' time. We will share in a liturgy of confession and lament for white supremacy.

**The Easter Vigil, April 16, 7 pm** will include the new fire of resurrection (a bonfire in the backyard) and will move indoors for worship with Holy Communion. Three Good Shepherd youth will affirm their baptisms with the Rite of Confirmation.

### **UPDATE ON FELLOWSHIP HOUR & SOUP SUPPERS**

So far, 43 members of the congregation have responded to the survey about Fellowship Hour and Lenten Soup Supper. # GOOD SHEPHERD MISSION ENDOWMENT FUND SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS ON DEAN'S LIST

Hallie Johnson and Ava Holland, recipients of Good Shepherd EPIC scholarships for the 2021-2022 academic year, have been named to the 2021 fall semester Dean's List at Luther College. EPIC (Educational Partners In Covenant) scholarships are awarded annually to Good Shepherd members attending ELCA colleges or universities. The Good Shepherd Mission Endowment Fund, established in 1993 and managed by the MEF committee, is the funding source for the scholarships.

To be named to the Dean's List Hallie and Ava had to earn a grade point average of 3.5 or better on a 4.0 scale for the semester. Hallie is a junior majoring in English and Nordic Studies and Ava is a sophomore majoring in Global Health.

Each academic year Good Shepherd members attending ELCA colleges or universities have the opportunity to apply for a Good Shepherd EPIC scholarship. Announcement of award recipients is made on June 1st. This year Good Shepherd will have five members of the congregation eligible to apply for a scholarship, the largest number since the ministry began. The growth of eligible scholarship applicants is in direct correlation to the overall growth of our congregation.

Each EPIC award is \$1000 and that amount is typically matched by the ELCA college or university. Applications for MEF scholarships for the 2022-2023 academic year will be available April 1st and must be returned to the church office by May 1st. The committee is planning to conduct an informational meeting for eligible students and their parents on Sunday, April 3rd in the Gathering Space after the worship service. Any member of the congregation interested in this ministry is also invited to attend.

Gifts and memorials are encouraged to help support this ministry. Growth projections indicate that the fund will need to support eight to ten students annually within the next three years. Presently the fund can support up to five awards.

### LOOKING AHEAD TO SUMMER: AN INVITATION TO SHARE ABOUT HOW TRAVEL HAS SHAPED YOUR FAITH

When summer comes, we usually think about vacation and travel. This summer Good Shepherd will share in a summer series called "Travels with the Spirit: A Summer Travelogue Through the Book of Acts." The Book of Acts is all about travel. "You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." The book begins with Jesus' Ascension and the coming of the Spirit at Pentecost. The Spirit is the one in charge throughout the book, and the church is always struggling to catch up to what the Spirit is doing. # UPDATE FROM GOOD SHEPHERD SEMINARIAN: KATHRYN THOMPSON

Beloved Good Shepherd,

As I begin my fourth semester of seminary, I again send my thanks for the continued financial support for my seminary and candidacy journey. It means so much to have my home congregation support my family and I in this way.

After the conclusion of this second year of seminary, I will begin my year of formal internship. My internship will be a Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) residency at Gundersen Health System in La Crosse, WI. This will begin in August and continue for one year. It will serve as my formal internship for candidacy to become a pastor in the ELCA. The residency will help me to continue my own personal growth and training for providing spiritual care while also serving as a chaplain-in-residence at Gundersen Hospital.

Our family has decided to relocate to La Crosse, as the demands of the residency will be great. We will be moving from Decorah this spring and resettling in La Crosse before summer. We plan to remain in La Crosse for another year after my residency concludes, which will be my last year of academic study at seminary.

# WELCA - NEWSLETTER

**Lutheran World Relief (LWR) Kits:** Once again this year, we will be collecting items for LWR personal care kits during Lent. Collection containers will be set up in the Gathering Space by the secretary's office.

- **We are in need of:** light-weight bath-size towels (between 20"x 40" and 52"x 27"), dark color recommended; 4 oz bath-size bars of soap, any brand, in original wrapping; sturdy combs; metal nail clippers (attached file optional).
- We will also have a basket set out for baby care kit items. Items we are in need of are: receiving blankets, medium weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, between 36" and 52" square; cloth diapers, flat fold preferred; hand towels, dark color recommended; 4 oz bath-size bars of gentle soap, any brand, in original wrapping. Diapers can also be made from flannel by using pinking shears to cut pieces approximately 22" X 27". If the flannel is especially lightweight, consider making the diapers two layers thick. It may also be necessary to zig zag the edges to prevent raveling.
- **Thrivent Action cards** are always appreciated. If you are a Thrivent member, you can apply for an Action card to purchase items for the kits. Contact Bev Sheridan if you have questions about the kits or the action card.

### **Gather Bible Study:**

### The kingdom of God: What does it mean for God to be in charge?

New Testament scholar Mark Allan Powell looks at a widely used biblical image and invites us into a discussion of what it might mean for Lutheran women today. The phrase "kingdom of God" and similar expressions turn up repeatedly in sayings of Jesus, so understanding what that expression means helps us to make sense of numerous parables and popular Bible passages (including the Lord's Prayer). Eternal life in the Gospel of John – In the fourth Gospel Jesus uses the expression "eternal life" to talk about what he calls the "kingdom of God" in the other Gospels. The phrase does not just refer to life that is eternally long, but also (indeed, especially) to life that is eternally deep—life that is endless in value and meaning. We will look at some popular passages, including John 3:16 and the story of Jesus and the woman at the well to discover how our lives can be marked by love and purpose. (from Gather website)

# CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING NOTES Tuesday, February 15, 2022 - 7:00pm

#### Preparing Our Hearts and Minds to Serve

<u>Present</u>: Pr. Amy Zalk Larson, Cynthia Ernst, Ann Naslund, Bob Naslund, Chris Johnson, John Moeller, and Hayley Jackson. Ingrid Callaghan present over speakerphone. Tim Lecander and Tom Buresch were absent.

Devotions and Initial Actions: Cynthia led devotions.

#### **Consent Agenda:**

Items in the Consent Agenda are designed to be approved by consent of the council without discussion or formal vote. The items in the consent agenda are considered approved when the meeting agenda is approved. Before approving the meeting agenda, the chair asks if any member wishes to move an item from the consent agenda to the discussion agenda if the member feels a discussion is warranted.

- 1. Approval of the February 2022 Council meeting minutes.
- 2. Reception of committee reports as submitted.
- 3. Reception of two associate members, Dave and Jan Siefken

The Consent Agenda was approved by the consent of the Council.

#### **Discussion Agenda:**

<u>Authorize President and Vice-President to Access Bank Account and Safety Deposit Box</u>: Council authorized President Cynthia Ernst and Vice-President Tim Lecander to access the Good Shepherd bank account and safety deposit box. John Moeller and Hayley Jackson will continue as Treasurer and Secretary respectively.

Final Sabbatical Proposal: Pr. Amy shared her finalized sabbatical proposal, including information on pastoral coverage and re-entry and the proposed budget. Pr. Rolf Svanoe, Pr. Stacey Nalean Carlson, and Pr. Karla Wildberger will provide coverage during the 13 weeks she is on sabbatical. Erica Yaneff and Brooke Joyce will be given an additional week of vacation and Kelli Gapinski will have additional support for VBS, already built into the Education budget. She also reviewed planned sermon topics and events, including Summer Travel Series potluck being planned by Outreach and Hospitality. Pr. Amy will return in time for the high school youth trip, July 24-27 (no longer the ELCA Youth Gathering, as that was canceled) and will participate as a voting member in the Churchwide Assembly, August 8-13. Council was supportive of the full proposal and budget. Questions included whether or not Pr. Svanoe, who is providing the bulk of the coverage, would be working with committees during her absence. Pr. Amy explained he would not be, and she will spend time with committees before the sabbatical to ensure they are prepared before she leaves. Pr. Svanoe will attend the May Council meeting, but not the June one. Bob Naslund moved to accept the final sabbatical proposal and its budget. Chris Johnson seconded. Motion carried.

Kinderhaus Rent Discussion: Cynthia and Pr. Amy caught up new council members on past discussions of the Kinderhaus rent agreement. The three-year space-sharing agreement concludes at the end of this school year, so a new one will need to be established. Cynthia intends to meet with the Kinderhaus director soon, as their board meeting is March 9 and they will need to discuss their options. Council discussed various options for space-sharing agreements and rental rates, taking into consideration potential agreement lengths, increased costs of utilities, space usage, and benefits of Kinderhaus being in the space. Questions included how much the cost of heat has increased (last year we paid about \$3,800 for electricity, this year we have budgeted for \$5,000), and how much an increase should be (the current rent is \$600 per month). The increase in costs were due more towards the increase of utility prices rather than usage. Council agreed to have Cynthia discuss rent with Kinderhaus. Chris moved to authorize Cindy to discuss rent with Kinderhaus and to have a discussion about facilities usage for the upcoming school year. Ann Naslund seconded. Motion carried.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> John Moeller reviewed the Treasurer's report. Chris moved to approve the report. Bob seconded. Motion carried.

#### Recurring Work of the Body - Committee, Pastor, and Officer Reports

The Committee Reports were received and accepted as submitted.

Education: Ann Naslund

The Faith5 cross generational ministry will take place in February and go through Lent. This year's Lent project is raising funds for Afghan refugee arrivals to the United States. Vacation Bible School will be August 2-4, 5-7:30pm

Outreach and Hospitality: Ingrid Callaghan

An All-church potluck is tentatively set for Thursday, August 18th. The Annual Fall Friends and Neighbors Picnic will be held on September 11, 2022. Members of Outreach and Hospitality will be assisting with the Faith5 cross generational ministry.

<u>Pastor's Report</u>: Pr. Amy

Pr. Amy continues to serve as dean of the ELCA congregations in our area. She encourages committees to assess their work with regard to the Racial Justice Statement. She also encourages everyone to participate in the Fatih5 ministry.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> John Moeller

Total income for this year as of January 31 was \$25,898.34 and expenses were \$21,170.89, leaving us with a surplus of \$4,727.45.
