Your Stewardship Committee spotlights Youth and Family Ministry this month. Good Shepherd has been blessed over the years with wonderful young people who have grown in faith in this congregation and gone on to serve others in remarkable ways. Our intergenerational engagement goes beyond traditional youth programming, as the youth themselves have led the congregation in social justice initiatives, community-building efforts, stewardship, and Christian discernment. It is fair to say that our church would not be as vibrant and growing as we are without the engagement of our members across generations and the leadership of our youth.

Just look at what's going on this summer! Recently, young members have led all of us in Faith Five conversations, helping us to start to reestablish our in-person Fellowship around faith. In June and July youth leaders are spearheading a congregational bike ride and movie nights, not to mention an online "selfiie" campaign -- all building community around church. There will be a buzz of activity in the church in August with this year's vacation bible school on the theme of Compassion, which couldn't be more timely for congregational and daily life.

And this year youth will make a service and learning trip to the Twin Cities! This trip reminds us of the history of hands-on service projects and efforts at Good Shepherd, and stands as an inspiration to further extend our mission and faith-building outside the congregation and the church campus.

We are blessed as well to have strong ties to EWALU, through campers and counselors. With church support, EWALU remains a valuable asset to youth ministry in our region.

We all give thanks and shout alleluia to our Education Committee and to our Children, Youth and Families Minister, Kelli Gapinski, for good leadership and for recognizing that youth ministry is a ministry of the whole church. And thanks to younger and older people in our congregation for recognizing that we can all be gifts to each other in our faith journey together. Alleluia!

PROPOSAL PROCESS REPORT: MISSION GREEN CARBON NEUTRAL INITIATIVE

It has been the goal of Mission Green to be as transparent as possible with all information regarding the proposed initiative for Good Shepherd Church. We are also trying to keep costs low to Good Shepherd by securing low cost loans, outside donations and applying for grants.

As we move closer to the June 5th Congregational vote of the Mission Green Initiative we want to share some additional information about our process involving church leaders and committee members.

December 2021:

Mission Green first approached Pr. Amy with the proposal. You may read her opinions about the Initiative in her May monthly newsletter.

February 2022:

Mission Green presented the early proposal to the Facilities and Grounds committee. This committee has now unanimously endorsed the Mission Green Initiative.

March 2022:

- Mission Green presented their proposal to the Social Justice Committee. This committee has now unanimously endorsed the Mission Green Initiative.
- Mission Green presented the Carbon Neutral Initiative to the Council Executive Board and Pastor Amy.
- Mission Green sent 40 letters to congregation members introducing the Carbon Neutral Initiative. April 2022:

Mission Green presented the Initiative to the Church Council. The Council voted to allow the Congregation to vote on the Initiative on June 5.

May 2022:

- Mission Green received unanimous endorsements from the Landscape Committee members.
- Mission Green presented two informational meetings at Fellowship Hour with guest speakers.
- Mission Green receives low interest loan (2%) from the Iowa Energy Development Authority. Available only if this project moves forward. This keeps costs to Good Shepherd low.

June 5 - Congregational Vote: In person and over Zoom

If project is accepted:

June 27 - Construction commences

December 31 - completion (hopefully much earlier)

Mission Green continues to provide private presentations for anyone wanting more information. Additionally, two YouTube videos were created to provide additional information and context. These videos are available on the church's YouTube channel as well as the www.missiongreen.llc website. It has been the goal of Mission Green to be as transparent as possible. We are very pleased with the support we have already received from many congregation members.

The Mission Green proposal is time-sensitive. We hope every member will take the opportunity to vote on June 5. The quorum needed is significant. We'll meet in the Sanctuary and also provide a Zoom Room (similar to what was done for the sound system/piano rebuild vote). We hope every member will make their voice heard.

GOOD SHEPHERD'S KRUMKAKE

Decorah will soon be celebrating its Norwegian heritage with its 55th year of Nordic Fest. Good Shepherd will also be preparing for their annual Krumkake Fest! Did you know that Good Shepherd has been participating in this event all 55 years?

Our first project in 1966, and for several years thereafter, was a quilt display here at Good Shepherd along with a *Konditori* (coffee shop) that served sweet soup, a variety of Norwegian cookies and coffee. The quilt display later moved to the high school. Then we were given a booth in front of the Bank of the West and began making and selling *krumkaker* using a favorite recipe from one of our charter members (Doris Klocke).

Planned by WELCA, the Krumkake demonstration and sale is an **all-congregation event.** Although this project is a fundraising event we've found that it is a wonderful fellowship opportunity for all (families, men, women and children) working together baking, demonstrating and selling those little cone-shaped cookies.

<u>All ages are invited to participate and no experience is necessary.</u> This year we will be baking at church from July 16-21 plus a gluten free day on the 25th (see church calendar for schedule). We will also be preparing the batter on Friday afternoon July 15 at 1:00 pm.

Krumkake Sunday will be on July 10. We will have a baking demonstration and also give you an opportunity to try your hand at baking. Krumkake will also be available to taste on the table during fellowship hour. On this day we will also put Good Shepherd labels on the baggies that are used for packaging. This is another fun "all congregation" event as every table is given labels and baggies to prepare.

Preparing krumkake batter at church: In order to comply with health regulations, we will be making the krumkake batter at church. We will be asking for donations (ingredients or cash) for preparing the batter. Sign-up sheets will be available at the church. Please have the ingredients to the church by the morning of July 15.

Baking: 9 sessions are planned at **church**, or you may want to bake at **home** or with a friend. Recipes will be available if you wish to bake at home. Come when you can and work only as long as you want. Bakers and rollers can sit down while working. If you are new to the krumkake baking experience, we will teach you (very easy to learn).

The monies raised (over \$3000) from our Krumkake project are given to many organizations including Aase Haugen, Decorah Free Clinic, Decorah Community Food Pantry, EWALU, LWR, Helping Services, LSI, and YAGM. Plus we also supported the GS CNA program, GS Seminary support, GS mission support and GS Path to Citizenship. Last year we also gave to the GS youth program and the GS endowment fund. This project benefits many locally and globally.

As you can see, there are several volunteer opportunities to choose from. Look for sign-up sheets for the various tasks on the table in the Narthex and also on-line with the Sign-up Genius. We are also looking for individuals to serve on our planning committee. Currently we have members ranging from 71 to 84 years old with an average age of 77 years. So we are looking for some new members to carry on the tradition of Good Shepherd participation in the Nordic Fest. - 3. How has travel changed you or changed the way you view the world?
- 4. Have you felt closer to God as a result of your travels?
- 5. Have your views of God changed as a result of your travels?

AUDIO/RECORDING WORSHIP SERVICES: Arrive ~9:15 and record once a month/every other month. We have the system here, please help us be able to use it to reach the community outside the church building. Contact the church office to get involved.

APRIL TREASURER'S REPORT

Our income for the year, as of April 30, was \$108,568 (last year at this time total income was \$103,387). Expenses, as of April 30, were \$102,117 (last year, due to some major projects early in the year, our expenses at this point, were \$114,635). That means we are running a surplus of approximately \$6,500, which compares with a deficit last year of about \$11,000.

Our statements of intent would predict offering income (envelope, auto pay, electronic deposits) of \$106,666 for the first third of the year. Our actual offering income as of April 30 was \$102,033. That means we are running a bit behind the projected offering income.

We have made the final payment for the sound system; the total, including sales tax, was \$26,411.05. We received donations for the project totalling \$25,025. We will draw from the contingency and facilities and grounds lines to make up the difference between the cost of the project and the donations received.

In short, one-third of the way through the year we are in good financial shape.

CARE FOR CREATION: WALK TO CHURCH DAY

Walk to Church Day offers a triple benefit: it's green, it's healthy, and it builds community. The benefit to the earth of leaving the car behind is obvious, and the benefits to physical health are well known. But walking is also good for the soul. In a small town, walking means running into neighbors. Designate a Walk to Church Day this summer. Or better yet, take the important step from symbolic action to new habit: encourage each other to walk at least a couple Sundays a month from June through October, and to figure out where commuting, errands and getting to school can also be done on foot. Remember the clear skies in cities when the pandemic shut down driving? Walking makes a real difference.

Fun fact: One 25-pound bag of MaSeCa makes 45 pounds or over 720 tortillas! So far, the Guatemalan Basics Fund has raised \$16,664 and spent



\$15,531, leaving a balance of \$1,132. Decorah Community Meal seeded the Fund to start; ever since, donors across the community have sustained the initiative through monetary gifts. The initiative continues to be managed by Decorah Community Meal. Decorah UCC serves as its fiscal sponsor.

CONGREGATION COUNCIL **MEETING NOTES** Tuesday, May 17, 2022 - 7:00pm

Preparing Our Hearts and Minds to Serve

Present: Cynthia Ernst, Ann Naslund, Bob Naslund, Tim Lecander, John Moeller, Ingrid Callaghan, Jim Fritz, Tom Buresh, and Hayley Jackson were present. Jim Fritz was present as a guest. Chris Johnson was absent. Pr. Amy is on Sabbatical.

Devotions and Initial Actions: Tom Buresh led devotions.

Consent Agenda:

Items in the Consent Agenda are designed to be approved by consent of the council without discussion or formal vote. The items in the consent agenda are considered approved when the meeting agenda is approved. Before approving the meeting agenda, the chair asks if any member wishes to move an item from the consent agenda to the discussion agenda if the member feels a discussion is warranted.

- 1. Approval of the April 2022 Council meeting minutes.
- 2. Reception of committee reports as submitted.

The Consent Agenda was approved by the consent of the Council.

Discussion Agenda:

Kinderhaus Space-Sharing Agreement: Cynthia reviewed the new Kinderhaus spacesharing agreement, which has been signed by Pr. Amy. It lasts for three years (through the end of the 2024-2025 school year). The rent has been increased to \$650 per month, which includes their portion of the fire alarm monitoring system. Bob Naslund moved to accept the space-sharing agreement as signed by Pr. Amy, Tim Lecander seconded. Motion carried. **Prayer Shawl Proposal:** Cynthia and John Moeller shared a proposal from Jeri Laursen, chair of the Prayer Shawl Ministry to transfer money from undesignated memorial funds (Tangen, Bolson, Rendack, and Kaasa) to the Judy Mikkelsen Fund account, which has traditionally been used to support this ministry's work (purchasing yarn, postage for sending shawls outside Decorah, bags/tissue for the gifting of shawls). This transfer, in addition to a \$270 grant from Thrivent supported by Pr. Amy, would bring the fund to \$600. Jeri additionally shared that when the 2023 budget is drafted, she will propose a new line item be added for the Prayer Shawl Ministry, and that it become a formal subcommittee of Outreach and Hospitality, similar to the Communications Subcommittee. Council was generally in favor of the proposal. John moved to use the specified memorial funds and Thrivent grant for the Prayer Shawl Ministry. Hayley Jackson seconded. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: John reviewed his report for the month. Questions from Council included how our annual giving compared to previous years. John shared that we are ahead, but it can be difficult to compare as not all giving is monthly - some give two times a year for example. He emphasized that we are in good shape, with the sound system and piano expenses covered and a decrease in spending. Tom Buresh moved to accept the treasurer's report. Ann seconded. Motion carried.

Maintenance/Custodial Position: Council discussed the resignation of Sharyl and Dave Haugen and hiring a replacement. John and Jim Fritz both shared that Erica Yaneff had expressed interest in the position in addition to her ministry coordination role. Council discussed salary, training, and time-reporting options.

Mission Green Proposal: Cynthia shared feedback she received from congregation members about the Mission Green proposal, including concerns about the timeline. Discussion included the format of the congregation meeting (in person after the service, with a Zoom option for those worshiping from home), how the project would be affected if we moved the timeline back (concerns about rising costs, heating in winter), and providing more information to answer congregational questions. John suggested creating a Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) style document to be shared with the congregation to answer the most common questions received from members. Council agreed this was a good idea and compiled a list of questions.

Recurring Work of the Body - Committee, Pastor, and Officer Reports

The Committee Reports were received and accepted as submitted.

Education: Ann Naslund

Sunday School in person resumed April 24-May 15. The Lenten project raised funds for Afghan arrivals presented to LSI representatives - they met their goal of \$5,000. Donated funds above the goal were donated to Ukraine support efforts. Sunday School will resume on September 11, 2022 (Rally Day). They also discussed graduation, summer activities, and planning for Vacation Bible School.

Worship and Music: Tom Buresch

Royalties for Spirituals: Bobby Vrtis presented a draft proposal of reparation royalties for spirituals. The committee discussed it and how it fits with the goals of the Good Shepherd Racial Justice Statement. The committee intends to refine the proposal over the summer and present it to the Council in August. Traveling with the Spirit—A Summer Travelogue through the Book of Acts: Because only one person has signed up so far, the committee decided that each committee member would invite two people to participate. In addition, committee members will give a brief invitation (like a Temple Talk) during worship services in May. Involving more people in the worship services: It was reported that the Stewardship Committee is looking into setting up ministry teams to encourage more people to participate in worship assistance.

Treasurer's Report: John Moeller

Total income for this year as of April 30 was \$108,566 and expenses were \$102,117, leaving us with a surplus of about \$6,500 (the income includes \$5,556, which is one-third of the total 2022 offerings paid by some individuals at the start of the year). At the same time last year, our income was \$103,387 and expenses were \$114,635, which left us at a deficit of about \$11,000. The budget is in good shape, although we are behind on projected offerings based on Statements of Intent, as we received \$102,033 and predicted \$106,666. The total cost of the sound system ended up at \$26,411.05 (including \$1,727.83 in sales tax). We received a one-time \$25,025 donation to cover it. The remaining \$1,400 will be made up from the budget - John will divide it between contingency funds and Facilities and Grounds.
