God makes no exceptions. In the spirit of Jesus Christ, we offer trust and respect to all, including those who may experience alienation, distrust, or rejection.

We rely on the healing, unconditional love of God to shape our community in the name of the Good Shepherd.

In keeping with our welcome, Good Shepherd is a Reconciling in Christ partner congregation, affirming our welcome to persons of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions, and our commitment to anti-racism work so that all may participate fully in the life of our congregation. We are an AMMPARO Welcoming Congregation - Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities.

Today in worship we center the sounds and stories of Black American music. We'll sing familiar hymns and liturgy in new ways that reflect the history of the spirituals, jazz, and Afro-Caribbean music. In this music, we hear hope and lamentation, joy and dance, and the cultural imperative towards community, self-expression and creativity. In a society that violently suppressed individual freedom through enslavement and Jim Crow segregation, Black American music was both a means of survival and a form for expression of the deep spiritual need to express one's whole self. In bringing this music to worship in a predominantly white church, we challenge and reject the expressions of white supremacy that emphasize Eurocentric cultural traditions as superior to all others. By singing Black American music in worship we unequivocally lift up and celebrate the full humanity of Americans of African descent and all people.

PRAYER BELL - WELCOME- ANNOUNCEMENTS

RACIAL JUSTICE LITANY: The assembly joins the parts in bold. Leaders will read the statement, noted in italics, so that we can all reflect upon it.

We proclaim.

We proclaim that God has created the diversity of humankind in God's image and we are all equal and beloved children of God. Racism and white supremacy are evils that estrange us from one another, from God, and from the fullness of our humanity.

May all that we say and do proclaim your love, O God.

We are in need.

We are in need of liberation from the sins of racism and white supremacy.

Liberate us, O God.

We confess.

We confess by what we have done and left undone that we have perpetuated systems of racial injustice and violence.

Hear our confession now O God; and liberate us.

We acknowledge.

We acknowledge that Good Shepherd Lutheran Church is built on land that was home to the loway, Otoe-Missouria, Eastern Dakota, Sac, Fox, Winnebago and Ho-Chunk tribes. In 1848, over two thousand Winnebago were forcibly displaced from here by the U.S. military to make way for European-American settlers.

We name this truth before you, O God.

We lament.

We lament that the white Church in the United States, through its dominant place in our country's culture and history, has actively constructed, justified, and sustained systems of racial injustice and violence. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America has marginalized Lutheran Black, Indigenous, and People of Color leaders and communities and perpetuated a patriarchal, monocultural and racially segregated status quo.

Hear our laments, and the laments of all your people, O God.

We trust.

We trust in the new life made possible through Christ's resurrection and we are hopeful that the Church is an ideal place to engage in the lifelong and transformative work of racial justice. Fostering antiracist ideas and actions is one way that we can follow Jesus' example of love for our neighbor. When we fail, we will rely on God's grace, that God might work in and through our broken humanity and that we might be sustained to learn from our mistakes and continue to show up for the work of antiracism.

We trust you. Help us to do your work, O God.

We commit.

We commit to listen, learn, and act with courage, kindness, respect, and humility as we practice antiracism both individually and as a congregation.

We commit to live as your people, O God.


We publicly declare.
