# FINDING OUR ROOTS IN THE STORY

The theme for worship this summer is **Finding our Roots in the Story.** We will explore biblical stories from Genesis and Exodus, stories that help us to know more of who God is and who we are as God's people. Worship will look a bit different. Each week, we'll hear just a reading from the Old Testament and a brief Gospel reading. The stories come from the semicontinuous readings in our Revised Common Lectionary. We will also be using Rev. Dr. Rolf Svanoe's book, *I Love to Preach the Story: Finding our Roots*, which is a guide for preachers and congregations diving into these stories in worship.

Ava will be a senior at Luther College and has been awarded her fourth Good Shepherd EPIC scholarship. She is working toward a Health Promotions major with an Applied Leadership and Management minor. While at Luther, Ava has been a 3-year member of the Norse volleyball team and has been on the SAAC and DEI committees. She also has been on the Dean's list every semester, and is a three-time member of the All-Conference Academic Volleyball Team. # REFLECTION FROM VISITING THE GEORGE FLOYD MEMORIAL



This last summer, I had an opportunity to travel to Minneapolis with other Decoraharea youth on a wonderful 3-day trip. We did volunteer work, explored the Mall of America, and learned about the surrounding area. As part of this very learning process, we were invited to take a tour of the George Floyd memorial in Southern Minneapolis. We took a bus to a nearby church and talked with congregation members before walking to the actual memorial down the street. The whole experience was very moving, as we got to see some real people around the area and see how the events that had transpired there affected them. In fact, if I had to mention the most impactful thing that came out of that trip it would be seeing and conversing with nearby residents. It put unique human faces to the story, which showed me the human impact.

When we hear a news story, oftentimes even if we are shown pictures and videos, we still are disconnected from the actual events. Traveling there and meeting people showed the scope of how impactful this memorial truly was (and is) for Minneapolis, the US, and the whole world.

#### **FALL SAVE THE DATES:**

# **RACIAL JUSTICE:** FRUITS & HOPES

At the Adult Forum on April 30th, Pastor Amy invited participants to reflect on the fruits they see from the racial justice work we have been doing at Good Shepherd these past three years.

- More than half the responses identified changes in worship: music, art, information in the bulletin, reading the Racial Justice Statement, and references in sermons.
- About a third of participants identified specific changes they noticed in their own lives: broader thinking, greater compassion, deepening faith, learning about white supremacy, personal growth, being energized, feeling greater hope.
- About a quarter of participants noted ways this is changing our congregation as a whole: how we are continuing to "walk the walk," seeing changes in how we work together (such as less hierarchical ways of working and organizing into flocks so the gifts of all are lifted up); sharing information about our racial justice statement and reparations with others beyond our congregation and finding that our work is inspiring others.

Pastor Amy also invited participants to share their hopes for our ongoing racial justice work. These ranged widely:

- There were specific suggestions, such as outside displays and recognitions, reading more widely, etc.
- One hope that was shared in different ways was showing God's love within Good Shepherd by
  welcoming strangers and recognizing everyone's gifts and moving beyond the congregation to share
  God's love with others, especially marginalized people or those who have felt excluded or hurt by the
  church.
- Several people mentioned hoping we could learn to be comfortable with discomfort because that's when change can happen and that we could keep being open to the Spirit and moving forward in spite times when things that turn out differently than we expected.
- Another theme was the hope that we keep grounding our work on our faith, God's love, God's grace. Our racial justice work is changing Good Shepherd, and it's changing us as individuals. As we change, the work we are doing ripples out to others. What fruits do you see at Good Shepherd from our racial justice work? What fruits do you see in your own life? May the Spirit continue to be at work in and through all of it!

# APRIL TREASURER'S NOTES

#### Income versus expenses

Income at the end of the month was \$116,000 and expenses were \$125,000. That means our deficit at the end of the month was just over \$9,000. Because giving comes in at different times and expenses vary from month to month it is hard to know what exactly to make of that deficit.

#### 2023 versus 2022

I'm never sure what comparison over time tells us but here they are. At the end of April last year our income was \$102,690. That means our income this year is significantly higher. Our expenses last year at the end of April were \$102,117. Our expenses this year also are higher; as I explained last month that should not surprise because our budget is higher.

#### Projected regular giving versus actual regular giving

When we put together our budget we anticipated regular giving (statements of intent) to be \$330,000. That would suggest giving one-third of the way through the year would be \$110,000. In fact, our regular giving at the end of April was \$101,201. Again, because many people no longer give weekly or monthly but rather quarterly, semi-annually, or even annually, it would be premature to conclude that giving has fallen behind statements of intent. At the end of June we will have a clearer sense of where we stand financially.

# GOOD SHEPHERD'S **KRUMKAKE DEMONSTRATION/SALE AT NORDIC FEST**10









Decorah will soon be celebrating its Norwegian heritage with its 56th year of Nordic Fest. Good Shepherd will also be preparing for their annual Krumkake Fest! Did you know that Good Shepherd has been participating in this event for all 56 years?

Our first project in 1966, and for several years thereafter, was a quilt display here at Good Shepherd along with a *Konditori* (coffee shop) that served sweet soup, a variety of Norwegian cookies and coffee. The quilt display later moved to the high school. Then we were given a booth in front of the Bank of the West and began making and selling *krumkaker* using a favorite recipe from one of our charter members (Doris Klocke).

Planned by WELCA, the Krumkake demonstration and sale is an **all-congregation event**. Although this project is a fundraising event we've found that it is a wonderful fellowship opportunity for all (families, men, women and children) working together baking, demonstrating and selling those little cone-shaped cookies.

<u>All ages</u> are invited to participate and <u>no experience is necessary.</u> This year we will be baking at church from July 15-21 plus a gluten free day on the 24th (see church calendar for schedule). We will also be preparing the batter on Friday afternoon July 14 at 1:00 pm.

**Krumkake Can Brigade** is **Sunday July 2**. This a fun way to help get the supplies from the annex to the fellowship hall. We will be looking for volunteers to move popcorn cans, pails, totes and other essentials from the annex to the Fellowship Hall.

**Krumkake Sunday will be on July 9**. We will have a baking demonstration and also give you an opportunity to try your hand at baking. Krumkake will also be available to taste on the table during fellowship hour. On this day we will also put Good Shepherd labels on the baggies that are used for packaging. This is another fun "all congregation" event as every table is given labels and baggies to prepare (visitors have also helped us).

#### Preparing krumkake batter at church

• In order to comply with health regulations, we will be making the krumkake batter at church. We will be asking for donations (ingredients or cash) for preparing the batter. Sign-up sheets will be available at the church. Please have the ingredients to the church by the morning of July 14. We will also have sign-up sheets for helping mix the batter.

#### **Baking**

• 9 sessions are planned at **church**, or you may want to bake at **home** or with a friend. Recipes will be available if you wish to bake at home. Come when you can and work only as long as you want. Bakers and rollers can sit down while working. If you are new to the krumkake baking experience, we will teach you (very easy to learn).

#### Selling at the Booth

- Selling- 3 hour shifts, stools available for sitting down
- Booth runner-gets full cans from the bank and returns empty cans to storage area (added position)

#### **Demonstrating during Fest**

- Baking Krumkake in Bank of the West-2 ½ hour shifts in lobby
- Krumkake bagger-puts fresh krumkake bags to be sold at the booth(added position)

The monies raised (over \$4000) from our Krumkake project are given to many organizations including Aase Haugen, Decorah Free Clinic, Decorah Community Food Pantry, EWALU, LWR, Helping Services, LSI, and YAGM. Plus we also gave to GS Seminary support, GS mission support and GS Path to Citizenship. Last year we also gave to the GS endowment fund, EWALU special appeal and Sunflower building fund. This project benefits many both locally and globally.

As you can see, there are several volunteer opportunities to choose from. Look for sign-up sheets for the various tasks on the table in the Narthex and also on-line with the Sign-up Genius. We are also looking for individuals to serve on our planning committee. Currently we have members ranging from 72 to 85 years old with an average age of 80 years. So we are looking for some new members to carry on the tradition of Good Shepherd participation in the Nordic Fest. #### Summer 2023 Bible study: Salvation Now by the Rev. Dr. Anna Madsen

#### Session One: Promised Salvation Now—Jesus Brings Wellness

Of all the gospel writers, John is uniquely concerned about the effectiveness of Jesus' immediate presence. One clue is his regular use of the word "now," a tiny but powerful word which appears more here than the other gospels combined. Together, we'll note a few instances of the "Now," and delve into John's observations about the way John focuses not so much on the "hereafter," but more on sharing the difference that Jesus makes in people's lives, straight away.

#### Session Two: Tangible Salvation Now—Christians Bringing Wellness

Following Jesus means expressing our solidarity with Jesus and his mission, in all we do. Because Jesus is the bringer of salvation, in his name, so, too, are we. Where there are wounds and brokenness, we are called to bring Jesus and the salvation he embodied. Together we'll examine the biblical and theological reasons for not waiting for it to all come out in the wash later, but for us to become faithful ambassadors of Jesus' salvation now.

#### Session Three: Needed Salvation Now—A World Wanting Wellness

Anyone who's been to a sports game knows John 3:16: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." Lesser known is John 3:17, which states: "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world but in order that the world might be saved ( $\sigma\omega\theta\tilde{\eta}$  sōth, from the root soteria) through him." In this session, we'll explore John's commitment to service, how we as Christians see the needs of a hurting world, and how because Jesus is the bringer of salvation, we are compelled to follow Jesus into the need now. # **OFFICE POSITIONS**

As we welcome Tristan into the Office & Building Manager position, we thought it would be helpful for folks to know what he will be doing and what Erica will remain doing. This is the current division of labor in the office. This may change a bit as we live into having two people in the office. Also, during Erica's maternity leave, Tristan will take over some of Erica's responsibilities. Erica will begin maternity leave no later than June 25. She will take 6 weeks of paid maternity leave and 6 weeks unpaid leave or fewer paid hours. Starting the week of August 14 she will be doing some work to prepare for fall programming. The week of September 18 she will return to her full set of responsibilities and will be working 15 hours per week.

Tristan works 9am-12pm every weekday.

- Records memorial gifts and produces acknowledgements.
- Collects receipts and compiles staff and church credit card statements for the treasurer.
- Pays bills when they come in or passes them on to the Financial Secretary to pay.

#### Office Management:

- Oversees all office systems and equipment
- Works with vendors to set up and manage contracts.
- Maintains vendor records and contracts.
- Orders supplies (office, kitchen, cleaning, worship).
- Prints sunday bulletins and assembles leader binders.
- Manages YouTube channel.
- Schedules rooms and meetings.
- Manages volunteers to help with office tasks

#### Worship Support:

- Generates worship bulletins and posts to website.
- Generates worship binders for leaders.

- Manages Licensing/copyrights for hymns and worship materials.
- Oversees those who record and stream worship services.
- Maintains prayer list.
- Works with Altar Guild to order supplies for worship services.

#### Outreach and Membership Support:

- Oversees outreach to new guests. & manages Sunday worship attendance sheets, and communicates with volunteers and Pastor regarding new attendance and interested members.
- Prepares materials to orient and welcome new members.
- Updates membership roster and oversees reporting of congregational information.
- Works with Congregation Council and Pastor on the updating of membership roster and periodic letters to inactive members about membership status.

#### **Ministry Support:**

- Generates sign-ups for events and other committee initiatives.
- Maintains and communicates instructions and information for those serving in roles with worship,
   Fellowship Hour, education, and other events.
- Supports Stewardship Committee and Shepherds with running and supporting the Flock Ministry in the day to day management/support for Flocks.
