I am so grateful for you. Together, we are worshipping, learning, witnessing, giving, and serving our community. Here are some highlights of the past month:

- We hosted a quarterly legal clinic here on September 1 for those seeking a path to citizenship. Thank you to all who accompany our immigrant neighbors.
- We dedicated the solar powered courtyard and celebrated that Good Shepherd is now officially a carbon neutral facility! We have been designated as a Cool Congregation by Interfaith Power and Light and our story is featured on their website: <u>interfaithpowerandlight.org/coolcongregations/good-shepherd-lutheran-church/</u> Thank you Mission Green and all who are giving generously of finances, time, prayer, and service to make this possible.
- We hosted a wonderful Welcome Friends and Neighbors Community Picnic for about 250 people. Much joy and connection happened that night! Thank you to the Outreach and Hospitality Committee, Erica, and everyone who participated.
- Seven 7th and 8th grade Confirmation students were blessed in worship and began classes. Three 9th graders are preparing to affirm their baptisms on October 29. Fourteen youth have registered to attend the ELCA Youth Gathering in July 2024. Thank you to Kelli and the Education Committee for your work in faith formation!
- The Racial Justice Team is helping the congregation participate in the ELCA Truth and Healing Initiative by hosting five opportunities to watch and discuss zoom presentations together. Thank you to the Racial Justice Team as well as Linda Donoghue and Kelli Gapinski, who encouraged the team to participate in this, and Cheri Lane for leading the sessions.
- We are participating in the ELCA process to develop a social statement about Faith and Civic Life by sharing in five Adult Forums on this topic this fall. Thank you to John Moeller for leading this and to all who are participating.
- We are gathering supplies to create school kits that Lutheran World Relief will distribute throughout the world. Thank you to Bev Sheridan and WELCA.
- We are exploring powerful stories from the Old Testament that help us reflect on who we are as God's people. Thank you to the Thursday Bible Study for helping us all learn from these stories. Their insights always shape the sermon. All are welcome to participate in the Bible Study every Thursday at 11:00 a.m.
- The amazing music offered in worship continues to inspire, uplift, console, and help us to pray together. Thank you to Brooke, Jon Ailabouni, and all musicians!
- Our Altar Guild works behind the scenes to prepare the feast of worship and communion and to help me take communion to the care facilities. Thank you!
- A large contingent from Good Shepherd took part in the unified witness to God's love and welcome at the Decorah Pride parade on September 16. Together with siblings in Christ throughout Decorah, we marched behind a sign proclaiming God is Love, Love is Love: Decorah Christians United in Celebrating Pride. Thank you to the Social Justice Team and all who participated.
- In response to the hate crime following Decorah Pride, a large contingent from Good Shepherd gathered to pray and help clean up the messages of hate at Decorah UCC and the courthouse. Thank you to all who participated.

- Good Shepherd had a booth at the first Luther College and City of Decorah Culture Fest. We shared the story of Good Shepherd's culture of welcome with pictures, our statements of welcome, prayer squares, and candy. Thank you to the Congregation Council for leadership on this and to all who participated.
- Shepherds and Flocks are serving on Sunday mornings together, potlucking together, and connecting with one another. Thank you to the Shepherds, Flock Servants, and the Stewardship Committee for the wonderful Flock Ministry!
- We have an amazing staff! Tristan did his own and Erica's job so beautifully during Erica's maternity leave. I'm grateful that they are now both working 15 hours per week. Tristan is in every day from 9am-12pm. Erica's hours rotate. A number of Good Shepherd folks have been watching webinars from the ELCA about Indian Boarding School, some of us watching from home and others gathering at church with conversation afterwards. Two recent ones–one with a survivor of an Indian Boarding School and one with descendants of Indian Boarding School survivors–were recorded and are available at **tinyurl.com/elca-boarding-school-sessions**.

What's the value of learning about difficult things like this? It's one way to be part of an effort by the ELCA "to learn the true history and current realities of Indigenous people. It is these truths, truths that have been ignored by most for hundreds of years, that will bring healing for both Indigenous people and non-Indigenous people," according to the ELCA's Truth and Healing website.

We profess a faith that calls us to love our neighbors. In learning about difficult things, we need to move past feelings and simply learning more. We are called to "do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with our God" (Micah 6:8) Doing justice calls us to walk with those carrying the burdens of the past by hearing their stories and their thoughts on what can be done to help bring truth and healing. That's what the ELCA is doing with this initiative.

We at Good Shepherd are learning more about this part of our history. It hits close to home because people who were connected to Luther College were involved with the Bethany Indian Boarding School in Wisconsin. There was an Indian Boarding School in Allamakee County. The land on which our church stands was taken from Indigenous people to enable European settlement.

Upcoming webinars from the ELCA's Truth and Healing initiative are available at the website listed above. Watch for programs on Indian Thought and Theology, the ELCA's work on Truth and Healing, and information on Land Acknowledgements. The Good Shepherd weekly email will continue to publish these as well.

For now, here's a prayer for all of us as we continue on this journey together: *Merciful God, thank you for calling us to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with you on this journey of truth and healing. Help us to open our hearts, minds, and lives to all you are calling us to do on behalf of your beloved people. Amen.*



Bev Sheridan recently returned from the Twelve Triennial Convention and Gathering of the Women of the ELCA. At the Convention we adopted resolutions on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion; Safety of our Children and a Calling for Peace and Unity plus a \$1.9 million budget. Anna Jetson from Highland Lutheran Church was elected to our Churchwide board for a 3 year term. We had inspirational and thought provoking bible studies and reflections on "Just Love through the lens of human trafficking, migration, and immigration" plus many workshops and servant events. The next triennial will be in Des Moines, Iowa in July of 2026. Plan now to attend this event in our home state!

Gather Bible Study

Fall 2023: "Holy places," a three-session Bible study by the Rev. Dr. Meghan Johnston Aelabouni. Physical places often shape our identities, relationships and faith. "Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it," Paul writes. Part of what this means is that faith doesn't just reside in our thoughts or emotions. Faith resides in our whole bodies, and how our bodies "live and move and have our being" in the sacred places where God encounters us.

October 2023 - Holy places: Sanctuary

For thousands of years, physical spaces have been set apart for individual prayer and community worship. "Sanctuary" is one word for such spaces. Throughout history, "sanctuary" has also referred to spaces of safety and refuge. If God is everywhere, what is the importance of sanctuary? STEWARDSHIP APPEAL 2024

Living Stones: Building Up Our Spiritual House

1 Peter 2:5a Like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house.

THANK YOU for being a vital part of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. Like the living stones described in 1 Peter, each of us brings skills and talents to this congregation that benefit not only this church, but also the wider world beyond the Good Shepherd's doors. THANK YOU for being a key part, a living stone, of this spiritual house. Building on the work of the recent past, the Good Shepherd Living Stones Stewardship Appeal will focus on two key goals described as follows:



Goal #1: Supporting Our Growth Increasing support for Good Shepherd's growing ministry by \$25,000 over 2023 levels.

As Good Shepherd grows, this also means that staff and administrative support for this ministry is also growing. We are blessed to have a talented staff led by Pastor Amy. This team helps move the work of Good Shepherd forward through support of initiatives such as youth ministry, Flock Ministry, and social and racial justice, but this vital work also requires financial resources.

Why is this important? Good Shepherd is not immune from rising operational costs that any organization must contend with. To keep pace with operational costs, continue to support a growing and vibrant congregation, and continue to give 26% of our operating expenses to needs in the world, the Stewardship Committee is seeking to raise an additional \$25,000 beyond 2023 levels.

Goal #2: Supporting our Coming Together Raise an additional \$5000 for Pergola Courtyard Furnishings

Once the stewardship appeal has achieved the first goal of increased support for Good Shepherd's growing ministry, a follow-on stretch goal is to raise an additional \$5,000. These funds will go toward the purchase of additional furnishings to support the new courtyard space that has been created through the Mission Green project.

Why is this important? In the brief time it has been open, this courtyard space has proved to be a great community venue for outdoor gatherings such as the recent Friends and Neighbors Community Picnic. The purchase of these additional furnishings will enhance the functionality of the Pergola Courtyard and make it a better community gathering space.

Increased giving in 2024 will allow us to meet these goals. We invite you to consider how you can build up this spiritual house in 2024. Please watch for more information in the month ahead.



NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS (NHN) HAS URGENT NEED FOR DRIVERS AND HAULERS

NHN is a partnership between Decorah United Church of Christ (UCC) and the Northeast Iowa Peace and Justice Center's Immigration Working Group. This partnership sponsors and coordinates rides for families and individuals to get to Immigration & Customs Enforcement (ICE) check-ins, lawyer appointments, and court dates. TRANS MUTUAL AID FUND: The lowa Trans Mutual Aid fund has the goal is to provide financial assistance to Trans and Nonbinary individuals in the state of Iowa as they access gender-affirming care. The Social Justice team at Good Shepherd has decided to participate in this effort to facilitate life saving care to those without the financial resources to access it on their own. This means we would provide transportation to and from Telehealth or in-person medical appointments in Minnesota, Illinois or Wisconsin and would provide overnight stays or safe places to stay for those traveling to or waiting for appointments in these states. MEF proposes "That a \$5000 line item be included in the congregation's annual budget to be utilized by the Mission Endowment Fund Committee in administering the congregation's EPIC scholarship ministry. The \$5000 would supplement the 4% of the total fund allowed annually by the MEF continuing resolution for the scholarships. Any remaining balance of the \$5000 supplement would automatically be placed in the MEF accounts to assist with fund growth. The committee reserves the option of requesting additional funds depending on the number of scholarship applications received in any given year.
 - b. Precedence for this proposal is based on Good Shepherd's tradition of annually financially supporting seminary students who are members of Good Shepherd. In the not-too-distant past Good Shepherd supported as many as 6 or 7 seminary students. Their support was considered part of our 26% benevolent commitment in the annual budget. Currently Good Shepherd seminary student support is at a minimum. Since we are facing a bit of an urgency, support for the EPIC scholarship ministry could also be considered a part of the 26% benevolent commitment."

Treasurer -

- Profit & Loss. total income through August was \$241,663.05 and total expenses were \$253,518.61. That means the deficit was up again, this time to \$11,855.56. Expenses always shoot up the month we make our Synod offering and I presume the deficit will decline at the end of September. It remains possible we won't end the year with a deficit, but in the October meeting the council may want to discuss whether you are comfortable ending the year with a deficit.
- Statements of Intent & Actual Giving. Projected regular offering (statements of intent)
 through August was \$220,000. Actual regular giving (Envelope + Designated + ACH +
 Retirement Funds) was \$214,329. That puts the actual giving a bit behind intended giving
 but there is a caveat: due to a misunderstanding regarding one statement of intent and a
 death, the gap between statements of intent and actual giving is not as large as it appears.
- French Drain/Courtyard. The final cost for the French drain and courtyard was \$28,994.81. The 2020 surplus and the contributions in response to the requests for funds totaled \$36,650.87. That means we have \$7,656.06 available for purchasing seating for the courtyard area.
