I've also been reflecting about energy in the congregation. Our life together is powered by the most renewable source of energy of all, the Holy Spirit. How is the Spirit energizing our community right now? I'd love to learn what you're seeing. Here is where I'm seeing the Spirit at work:

- We are now fully carbon neutral! I'm so grateful that our building is now completely powered by renewable energy. Thank you, Mission Green. Thank you, Good Shepherd! And thank you to everyone who gave to the courtyard renovation project. We had a goal of \$12,000 and have raised over \$18,000. The additional monies raised will be used to help furnish the courtyard.
- We're finding ourselves in God's story. We've been empowered by a summer of diving deep into the Old Testament. These stories of faith have helped us to reflect on who God is and who we are as God's people. The Worship and Music committee and I have decided that we want to continue to explore these stories throughout the fall as we move through the book of Exodus, and maybe beyond!
- The Body of Christ is connecting as Flocks. It has been such a joy to hear of flocks connecting through potlucks and get togethers; and to see flocks sharing in the Sunday morning roles. Each Shepherd and each flock do things a little differently, each person serving does things in their own way. That is marvelous! God is at work in all our diverse gifts.
- The Congregation Council is leading beautifully! It has made such a difference to have a new format for leadership. Our council has formed a strong bond as a team. This has helped them to have thoughtful and wise discussions as they discern and lead.
- Our life together is connected to a strong witness in the community.
 - We shared in discussions around three books with the other ELCA congregations in Decorah this summer. Those were rich and wonderful. As a congregation, we'll return to the books throughout this year.
 - We will participate in Culture Fest, a collaboration between Luther College and the City of Decorah. See more on page 16.
 - We will again share in Decorah Christians United in Celebrating Pride. See more on page 17.
 - We helped to host Rev. Dr. Anthony Bateza, co-chair of the ELCA task force on Faith and Civic Life along with the other ELCA congregations. As a congregation, we will engage in discussion around faith and civic life during Adult Forums, Sept. 17-Oct. 15 and provide feedback to the task force as they draft a social statement. 

Confirmation Classes at Good Shepherd
These classes are a way for students to explore
and grow in faith and then affirm their faith
publicly. Classes also provide community,
connection with caring adults, and the
opportunity to affirm their baptismal identities
as God's beloved children.



Here is a general overview:

- Classes are taught by Pr. Amy. Youth Director, Kelli Gapinski, and other adults also help with Confirmation.
- Students explore the Bible, the Apostle's Creed, the Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandments as well as Lutheran teachings about them.



- Class is held most Wednesday nights in the school year from 7-8pm except during Advent and Lent. During Advent and Lent, students are expected to attend midweek worship with their family. During Lent students meet with a mentor during Lenten Soup Suppers.
- Most students do regular Confirmation classes in 7th and 8th grade but students can start later as well.
- During the fall of 9th grade, students meet two additional times to prepare for Affirmation of Baptism.
 9th graders are asked to write a brief faith statement.
- The Affirmation of Baptism service happens on the last Sunday in October on Reformation Sunday during the 9:30am worship service. Lulu Bellrichard, Victor Biedermann, and Colin Thompson will affirm their baptisms.

Here are specifics for 2023-24 for 7th-8th graders:

- Sunday, September 10: All 7th-8th grade Confirmation students will be blessed and new Confirmation students will be given a Bible.
- September 13 at 7pm in Fellowship Hall will be first Confirmation class this year.
- There will be no class and no midweek worship: 11, Nov. 22, Dec 27, Jan. 3, April 3.
- During Advent and Lent: Wednesday worship at 5:30 pm takes the place of class, students are expected to attend with families.
- Advent: Wednesdays, Dec. 6-20, 5:30pm
- Lent: Wednesdays, Feb. 21- Mar. 20, 5:30pm
- Ash Wednesday (Feb. 14), Maundy Thursday (March 29), Good Friday (March 28) worship services are at 7pm and take the place of class. Students are asked to attend with families.
- The last class of the year will be May 8.

Here are specifics for fall of 2023 for 9th graders:

- We will meet from 8-8:45pm on two Wednesdays: September 20 and October 11. 9th graders are asked to write a brief faith statement.
- This year the Affirmation of Baptism service for 9th graders will be Oct. 29, 2023 during 9:30am worship.



MISSION ENDOWMENT FUND UPDATE

EPIC Scholarship Growth Through Estate Giving

Erick Kephart To Present Adult Forum

This academic year (2023-2024) Good Shepherd's EPIC Scholarship Ministry (Educational Partners in Covenant) has awarded five members of the congregation \$1000 scholarships. Ava Holland (Luther College), Mara Holland (Gustavus) and Nathan Larson (Wartburg) are repeat recipients; Annalise and Daniel Skrade are freshmen at Concordia in Moorhead, Minnesota. Those scholarships have been matched by the participating colleges.



The EPIC scholarship ministry was established by the ELCA as a vehicle for participating congregations and colleges to financially assist students with a liberal arts education. Good Shepherd has been a participating congregation since 1994.

Monies for the Good Shepherd ministry come from the congregation's Mission Endowment Fund. Each year the MEF Committee is authorized to utilize 4% of the fund's total value to make the awards. The current value is approximately \$125,000, or five \$1000 scholarships. To date the MEF Committee has been able to grant a scholarship to every applicant of the congregation attending an ELCA college or university. However, because of the growing number of youth in the congregation, it is apparent that the MEF needs to grow significantly.

The committee has established a 3-pronged program to assist with meeting this challenge. In the short term donations, gifts and memorials are being accepted, and the annual Easter Brunch Fundraiser has been established.

Intermediate-term, the committee has asked the Congregation Council to recommend to the congregation that \$5000 be made available annually to assist with the ministry. This support would be provided until the fund has grown enough to meet the anticipated needs. The council will make a decision on this request at its meeting this month.

MISSION ENDOWMENT FUND UPDATE

In the long term, the solution to growing the fund appears to be through estate plan giving. To this end, the committee is concentrating on this process. Arrangements have been made for Erick Kephart, a Vice-President and Trust Officer at Decorah Bank & Trust, to assist with educating the congregation on the various aspects of estate plan giving. Erick will meet with the MEF Committee at its meeting this month and will present an Adult Forum at a later date, possibly in January.

Erick is a Decorah native who graduated from Decorah High School and was baptized and confirmed at Good Shepherd. His maternal grandparents, John and Jean Bruemmer, were founding members of Good Shepherd and Jean served for many years as the Good Shepherd Church Secretary. Erick graduated from Loras College in Dubuque and served in several banking positions before returning to Decorah as a DB&T Vice-President.

The MEF Committee is encouraging members of the congregation to consider ways they can include the Good Shepherd Mission Endowment Fund in their estate plans and to attend the Estate Plan Giving Adult Forum when the date is secured.



WELCA NEWSLETTER

Thank you to everyone who helped to make our Krumkake Sales a success. We had a net sales of \$4,194. This is after expenses and 10% to the Nordic Fest board. We had over 125 volunteers who clocked in over 670 hours. WOW! Thank you to everyone who willingly volunteered when the call went out for extra help and to those who did not turn the other way or run and hide when we came to coffee hour with a sign up sheet. This congregation is truly amazing.

Items needed for **baby care kits** are cloth diapers, small hand towels, infant sleepers, receiving blankets(up to 50 "square), sweater or jacket, cotton t-shirts, and 4 ounce soap bars. A donation box has been set up in the gathering space.

RACIAL JUSTICE DEVOTION

We Are Holding Up This Work

At our last Racial Justice Team meeting, one of our members came in with a question. She had seen our new racial justice logo printed at the top of the Racial Justice Statement posted in the hallway for the first time and found herself wondering: What is it that we are holding up as we do this work?

That question led to immediate answers around the table: We are doing this because white congregations (as a whole, through the years) have failed. We are doing this because systematic racism is endemic to our culture (lots of fancy words there meaning it's all around us and we can't escape it). We are holding this up to God in prayer asking for help. We are holding this up to remind ourselves and each other of our commitment at Good Shepherd to work for racial justice for all whose lives are touched by racism.

We wonder what others at Good Shepherd are holding up as they look at the logo. What do you see as our commitment as a congregation? What is your commitment as an individual? How are you carrying a part of this work in your own life, as part of Good Shepherd, as part of God's call for justice for all members of the beloved community?

We hold up our hands to you, O Lord, to declare that we need your help: In our hearts and in our minds, we have resolved to work towards racial justice, But this is culture-changing work, and it bewilders our souls.

We hold up our hands to you, our fingers bent with the weight of what we have inherited; Our revered foremothers and forefathers were humanly imperfect,
They meted out injustice in their blindness to the common humanity of the people around them.

Teach us, O Lord, how to balance the love we naturally hold for our ancestors, despite their flaws, with the love for our neighbors which we must foreground in our hearts and in our actions.

We hold up our hands to declare that we are committed to this work; We hold up our hands in humility, O Lord, as we seek your guidance and your blessing; We hold up our hands with gratitude, that our eyes have been opened to the necessity of this work;

We hold up our hands in invitation, that our friends and neighbors might join us; We hold up our hands with hopefulness, that our resolve will lead to change; We hold up our hands, O Lord, for through you, we build your beloved community; We hold up our hands, O Lord, for with you, we love our neighbors as you commanded; We hold up our hands, O Lord, we hold up our hands.

This gathering is an opportunity for the congregation to thank and celebrate its friends, neighbors and the entire Decorah area community, including Luther College students, faculty, and staff!

Come enjoy good food, good conversation, and meet new friends. The picnic features a bountiful potluck provided by members of the congregation, and many gluten free options. All beverages, paper products, and silverware will be provided. There will be live music by members of the Good Shepherd Band and Slim Whimsy, an ensemble featuring Erik Sessions and Josh and Ezra Vorvick, as well as games for kids.

WE NEED VOLUNTEERS to facilitate the picnic and to provide food! There are many ways to get involved with the welcome friends and neighbors picnic. Task descriptions are listed below in detail, and will be shared with you closer to the event as a reminder. Please direct any questions to the Church Office.

PICNIC VOLUNTEER ROLES EXPLAINED:

All Food/Drink donations

- When signing up add comments about what you are bringing in the "Comment" box
- Please bring to the Church kitchen by 4:30 on Sunday the 10th with a serving utensil
- Label all dishes and serving utensils so they make it back to you
- Please label any dietary notes (GF, V, Dairy free, etc.) as applicable

Sunday Yard Setup

• Put tablecloths and centerpieces on tables, put up chairs. Generally make sure the space looks inviting.

Greeter at Nametag Table

- Greet folks and invite them to put on a name tag
- Keep a tally of people that come (as able it's ok if its a rough estimate)
- Set up "Welcome to Good Shepherd" cards at the welcome table by the name tags

Coffee/Lemonade maker & Drink point person

• In charge of making coffee, decaf coffee, and lemonade prior to the event and throughout as needed. Help monitor drinks.

WELCOME FRIENDS & NEIGHBORS PICNIC

Dishes/Garbage

- Set out and maintain plates, napkins, silverware, and cups on the table. We will be using all disposable products.
- Set up recycling and trash bins from the kitchen outside and place full bags in the large outdoor bins by the Annex. Replace trash bags with new ones found under the kitchen sink.

Food Point Person

- Supervise the drop-off of food and help lead what food is set out right away and what is stored in the kitchen for later use.
- Make sure dishes/utensils are labeled with the person's name when they drop items off.
- Work with the food runners to organize the serving table and make sure food is labeled with any dietary specifications as needed.
- At the end of the night help organize food and dishes for people to take back home with them.

Food Runner

• Assist Food Point Person in organizing and maintaining food on the serving table so things are fully stocked and labeled as needed.

Kids Activity Helpers

• Help Kelli with activities and games!

Hot Dog Roaster

• Good Shepherd provides the hot dogs and buns, but we need a volunteer to cook the hot dogs in a roaster, and set the roaster out on the serving table.

Kitchen Cleanup

- Kitchen clean up should be happening throughout the event as possible
- Clean up kitchen as needed help with any food related cleaning/storing/labeling. As much as possible, food and dishes should be taken home by the people that brought them.

Yard Cleanup

- Gather tablecloths & centerpieces, wipe off tables, and help take down/load tables and chairs. Tent is handled by Decorah Rental.
- Walk through and pick up any garbage/trash in the yard.

Good Shepherd will participate in the 2023 Culture Fest, formerly known as the Ethnic Arts Festival. This year the event will be a collaboration between Luther College and the City of Decorah. It will be **Saturday**, **September 23**, **2023 from 3pm – 7pm in the parking lot where the Decorah Farmers Market is held**.

Culture Fest will provide an opportunity to celebrate the rich heritage of the diverse communities reflected on campus and in the community and region at large. The organizers believe it is important to have our area churches of various faiths represented at this event.

NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS (NHN) HAS URGENT NEED FOR DRIVERS AND HAULERS

- NHN is a partnership between Decorah United Church of Christ (UCC) and the Northeast Iowa Peace and Justice Center's Immigration Working Group.
- This partnership sponsors and coordinates rides for families and individuals to get to Immigration & Customs Enforcement (ICE) check-ins, lawyer appointments, and court dates. It also helps provide basic furniture to immigrants and families.

July Treasurer's Report -

Total income to date is \$214,924; total expenses are \$220,757. That means our deficit at the end of July was \$5,832. That is lower than it has been for most of the year, suggesting we are moving toward a balanced budget. We are slightly behind on our benevolence giving but presumably won't have as many large costs in the remaining months as we had earlier in the year.

Regarding giving, our projected regular offering through July would be \$192,500 and our actual regular offering was \$190,274. In other words, we are right on target.

According to Tristan's calculations, we already have received the income necessary to cover the costs of the French drain. Much of that money has come in after the end of July but I will provide a full summary of the costs and income for that project next month.
