Beloved People of God,

This month, I invite you to reflect upon the above scriptures that are the basis of our fall stewardship appeal. God has given us an incredible gift by making us members of the household of God. We belong. We have a purpose larger than ourselves.

God has also given us a strong foundation for hope with Christ Jesus. Sometimes it can feel like the world is falling apart. Yet God has not abandoned us. Instead, God is at work building us up into a spiritual house. Together as God's people, we become a temple of God's presence and a way God is known in the world. The spiritual house of this congregation provides strength and shelter and sends us out to help other's know God's presence with them.

We are invited to give generously to this spiritual house because it is good for us. The practice of giving forms us into grateful and generous people. Jesus says where our treasure is, there our heart will be also. We shape our hearts and our lives by how we choose to use our money and our time. Giving also helps us to trust that God will provide and experience the abundance God gives when we live our small selves behind.

We are also invited to give generously because we can do more together to help others experience God's loving care. This is certainly true for us as part of the ELCA. Together as the ELCA we are accompanying God's people in Ukraine, the Middle East, South Sudan, Maui, on the Southern Border and in so many other places through our Lutheran Disaster Response. Through our Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services we are helping to welcome others into shelter and safety. Our Lutheran Social Services ministry helps families to stay together in their homes and our ELCA World Hunger ministry works to help all people have enough to eat. Good Shepherd gives 26% of our operating expenses to ministry beyond the congregation. When you give to Good Shepherd, you can know that you are building up a worldwide house of refuge and shelter.

I also want to invite you to pray with one of my favorite prayers from Ephesians 3:14-21, below. When things look and feel hopeless, we can trust that, through Christ, God is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine. We can hope. We can love. We can trust. We can give. God is at work building us up to care for us and to care for all creation.

Living Stones: Building Up Our Spiritual House

1 Peter 2:5a Like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house.

THANK YOU for being a vital part of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. Each of us comes to this place for our own unique reasons, whether it be the fellowship of Sunday worship, the joy of serving in youth ministries, advocating for racial and social justice, performing music in praise of God, or helping to keep the church's facilities in tip-top shape. **Like the living stones described in 1 Peter, each of us brings skills and talents** to this congregation that **benefit not only this church, but also the wider world** beyond the Good Shepherd's doors. So, THANK YOU for being a key part, a living stone, of this spiritual house.

Our Stewardship Appeal this year focuses on being **Living Stones** ... on building the foundations to grow together within our faith community and reaching out into our neighborhoods.

- Through creative staffing and with the spiritual engagement of our members, we are able to hold the line on expenses for next year, with about \$10,000 in general inflation adjustments.
- At the same time, as we grow, we are experiencing generational turnover. We
 memorialize some of our elder members who have passed away or moved this year.
 This has an impact on giving at the higher levels, and leaves an income gap projected
 ~ \$15,000.

To keep pace with operational costs and to continue to support this growing and vibrant congregation, the Stewardship Committee is seeking to **increase giving by \$25,000 above 2023 levels.**

Building together requires each of us, with each of our varied gifts, working together to cement a foundation of living stones that will continue to grow.

If many of us can "level up", that is, move up a level or more on the giving chart, we can renew our support base from within. This leveling up, combined with our increased membership, will enable us to cover this gap. Please prayerfully consider leveling up your giving in the coming year to support our spiritual home together.

Plan to bring your intent for 2024 to worship on November 12th to come together and celebrate being living stones, building the foundations for one another for years to come.

NOW WHAT?

In September, the Racial Justice
Committee invited the congregation
and community to join in five ELCAhosted Zoom sessions on the topic of
Indian Boarding Schools. These
sessions were hosted at Good
Shepherd Lutheran Church and
shared for online viewing as a
learning opportunity. Some of the
sessions are recorded and can be
viewed here.



Vance Blackfox, a citizen of the Cherokee Nation and ELCA director for Indigenous ministries and tribal relations, hosted these sessions and many people in our community joined both in-person and virtually via Zoom. While these sessions were wonderful learning opportunities, the question on the minds and hearts of our Social Justice Committee is "now what?" Is there a tangible action we should be taking or encouraging? Or were these just great learning and awareness opportunities that we can store in our 'back pocket' that we might take out in the future as we come across an opportunity? I'm not sure there is a right or wrong answer here, but I do like to remind myself on occasion of a favorite Henry T. Blackaby (author of "Experiencing God") quote--"We don't choose what we will do for God; He invites us to join Him where He wants to involve us." And I'm also reminded from past experience that God calls us in different ways and at different times and to different needs.

While we continue to learn, for those feeling a calling to learn more or take some tangible action, I've listed a few suggestions below. And for those of you who are interested in how this connects to the ELCA church, here's a short historical summary. In 2016 the ELCA Churchwide Assembly memorialized the "Repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery," claiming this action for implementation across all expressions of the church. Yet there was very little action until 2021 when a task force was initiated and subsequently, the position of ELCA director for Indigenous ministries and tribal relations was created in the fall of 2021. NOW WHAT?

TANGIBLE ACTIONS YOU CAN TAKE IN 5 MINUTES

- Encourage our federal government to pass the Indian Boarding School Policies in the United States Act (S.1723): (<u>Click here</u>)
- Donate to this lowa/Midwest initiative. The Honor Native Land Fund (HNLF)
 provides an opportunity for non-Native people living in the Midwest to
 contribute to Native efforts to restore land by financially supporting the return
 of land in lowa to the Indigenous-led Great Plains Action Society (GPAS). You can
 support this cause here.
 - Due to colonial agriculture and the forced removal of Indigenous people, lowa is the most biologically altered state in the U.S.:
 - 99.9% of Prairies are gone
 - About two-thirds of Iowa's 36 million acres are planted in crops (corn, soybeans, hay, etc.), which require fertilizer, insecticides, herbicides, and petroleum.
 - Over 97 percent of lowa has been altered for cities, roads, and agricultural use.
 - Over 98% of agricultural land in Iowa is owned by white people. The Great Plains Action Society - an Indigenous-led organization made up of Meskwaki, Ho Chunk, Ioway, and other Indigenous people - are working to heal the racial and ecological harms of such colonization by restoring land and water in Iowa to Indigenous stewardship.

- Go see the October 20th major movie release, Killers of Flower Moon (<u>movie trailer here</u>) or read the book.
- Read the U.S. Dept. of Department of the Interior Bureau of Indian Affairs Investigative Report. (Click here)

- Watch the Ken Burns documentary, "We Shall Remain" (Click here)
- Join the ELCA research initiative to return Indian Boarding School records to their rightful ancestors or another activist organization that supports justice for the indigenous peoples of this land. (<u>Click here</u>)



Fall 2023: "Holy places," a three-session Bible study by the Rev. Dr. Meghan Johnston Aelabouni

Physical places often shape our identities, relationships and faith. "Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it," Paul writes. Part of what this means is that faith doesn't just reside in our thoughts or emotions. Faith resides in our whole bodies, and how our bodies "live and move and have our being" in the sacred places where God encounters us. In this Fall 2023 Gather Bible study, written by an ELCA missionary living in Jerusalem, we'll explore what holy places mean, not only for the Holy Land of the Bible, but for each of us, wherever we may be.

The ELCA has a longstanding relationship with partners in the region, including the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land and Augusta Victoria Hospital. Lutheran Disaster Response has a history of providing support for our partners and will be prepared to answer calls for assistance when the time comes. Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton has issued a letter of solidarity to Bishop Dr. Sani-Ibrahim Azar of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. In it, she writes, "I encourage the people of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to unite in prayer for the families of innocent civilians whose lives were lost, as well as pray for healing for all the injured, fearful and traumatized. I pledge our accompaniment and support to you as the Evangelical.....
