



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Our communion hymn, Wade in the Water, comes to us through the work of the Fisk Jubilee Singers who gathered hymns from their enslaved ancestors and sang them for white audiences. Wade in the Water connects us with the Israelites crossing the Red Sea to the Promised Land. It is said to be one of the songs used to guide slaves in our own country in their escape; wading in the water made it harder for their route to be detected. It is linked to Harriet Tubman's many trips south to lead enslaved Blacks to freedom, using this and other songs to to guide them on their perilous journey. Wade in the Water was recorded by protest artists during the 1960s as part of the Civil Rights Movement. The hymn encourages us to get into the water to do the hard work it takes to escape oppression even as it asserts that God is also already at work and will "trouble the waters." When we sing Wade in the Water we join the river of prayer sung by enslaved and oppressed people throughout history: the Israelites, enslaved Blacks; refugees fleeing war; victims of human trafficking and so many more. May God trouble the waters for all those searching for freedom, and may we all be moved to be part of God's work of bringing freedom through our prayers and actions.
