

You've loved and prayed for me as I grieve my parents who died too young and my dearest friend, Sarah, who died in 2016. You've provided care, love, and prayers as our family has healed after Nate's accident in 2019 and Matt's accident in 2021. Your kindness has sustained and encouraged me. Thank you, thank you, thank you.

I love you all and this congregation. Because I love this congregation, I will honor the boundaries required of pastors who leave congregations and won't do any pastoral acts (baptisms, funerals, weddings, and pastoral care) for you after January 7th. This allows the next pastor you call to become fully your pastor. I will remain your sibling in Christ. You will be in my heart and prayers. You will have my gratitude always.

- Pr. David Wrightsman will begin as our Intentional Interim Pastor January 1st.


YOUTH & FAMILY

RACIAL JUSTICE SPOTLIGHT

For the past year and a half, the Racial Justice Team has been devoting time at each meeting to learning about white supremacy culture and anti-racist alternatives. For our December meeting, the topic was how white supremacy culture defines progress. The answer is one we're all familiar with: Progress is Bigger and More... regardless of costs to those doing the work or the environment or other people or even the quality of the work itself. It's an easy definition of progress for churches to adopt: progress is more members, a bigger building, more people at worship. But for the Racial Justice Team, this meeting was also our last meeting with Pastor Amy, and it was a good moment to pause and ask what does the Christian faith say about progress? How should we look back at our last eight years with Pastor Amy and evaluate our progress? What goals should we be setting for our congregation as we call a new pastor?

When we asked what our faith has to say about progress, the six voices around the table lifted up the following thoughts:

- Are we seeing increase in the fruits of the Spirit? But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Galatians 5:22-23
- Are we seeing our life together as a congregation as a pilgrimage, where there are important steps to be taken one at a time, yet we focus not only on the end goal but how we care for each other and ourselves throughout the journey day by day?
- Are we judging our progress by whether we get a good result...or whether we have been faithful to the Gospel? Are we remembering that God works in ways we often don't understand and that our role is to be faithful, trusting God's promise that all is in God's hands?
- Are we growing in love-love of God and love of our neighbors?
- Are we growing from viewing things through the eyes of the secular world (for example, progress is bigger and more) to seeing things from God's perspective? For example, are we growing in our capacity to see that we are all beloved children of God (including those we disagree with or struggle to like)?
- Are we grateful for what we have? Do we see the blessings in where we are now? Are we taking care of what we have, including each other (instead of focusing on what we want next)?

As *you* reflect on our progress as a congregation, what do *you* see? How can we follow Jesus more faithfully in our life together? How can our new pastor help us do that?

AN UPDATE ON THE 2023-24 GOOD SHEPHERD MISSION ENDOWMENT FUND SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

This academic year the Good Shepherd Mission Endowment Fund awarded a scholarship to five members of the congregation: Ava Holland, Mara Holland, Nathan Larson, Annalise Skrade and Daniel Skrade. All five are doing very well at the college of their choice.

AVA is a senior at Luther majoring in Health Promotions with an emphasis in Sports. She has a minor in Applied Leadership and Management. She is a member of the Luther volleyball team and has been a member of the American Rivers Academic All-Conference Team. She has also been a member of the campus Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Committee. She plans to utilize her Luther educational experiences in the Twin Cities after graduation this coming spring.

MARA is a sophomore at Gustavus Adolphus in St. Peter, Minnesota and has not committed to a major. She is a member of the Gustavus volleyball team that compiled a 27-6 record this fall and participated in the Division III NCAA Regional Tournament. Academically Mara has been on the President's List. She has also coached a youth club volleyball team in St. Peter.

NATHAN is a sophomore at Wartburg College in Waverly. He is concentrating on his long- term goal of entering the ministry. His plan is to attend Wartburg Seminary in Dubuque upon completion of his studies at Wartburg College.

Winter/Spring 2024 Bible study: "Scripture and nature: Teachers of faith" by the Rev. Sara Olson-Smith

The scriptures themselves help us see the important role of the created world in God's story and saving work. "THE F-WORD: STORIES OF FORGIVENESS" EXHIBITION at Luther College Center for Faith and Life, second floor

Discussion Agenda

1. Review proposed 2024 Church Budget especially the benevolence giving

- The Racial Justice team requests that Council ensure that of the 26% of our budget that is given to ministry beyond the congregation include funds for the three current initiatives of the Racial Justice Team: 1) educating congregational leaders and others about their role in dismantling racism by understanding and counteracting White Supremacy Culture; 2) moving beyond African American music to learning about and taking action to undo injustice against Black people, and 3) participating in the Truth and Healing Initiative that addresses injustice against Indigenous people.
- Rationale: In order to carry out the congregation's intent in adopting a Racial Justice Statement, the congregation should examine all aspects of its work, including the budget, to ensure that this commitment is played out in all aspects of congregational life. The annual 26% amount for ministry beyond the congregation is a place where our commitment to Racial Justice should be evident.
- Proposal: increase Mission Support to the synod/ELCA as this directly funds the Truth and Healing initiative and the ELCA racial justice work.
- Aase Haugen appeal: The congregations are being asked to raise \$300,000 over 3
 years for the chapel at the new Aase Haugen care facility. See letter here
