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WORDS FROM PR. DAVE: THE SEASON OF LENT

The beginning of Lent always puts me in the mood to think back to the gloomy feeling I remember feeling from growing up, as well as the way my Catholic friends always "gave up" something, and the ashes on my forehead getting smeared by my siblings. Having to go to church twice week also was a part of feeling depressed and dismal about church in general nd Lent in particular.

When I was in college, I remember clearly the experience of standing outside of St. Basils Cathedral in downtown Moscow as a part of a study trip. Suddenly I heard a huge commotion inside. A boy came running out, chased by a church official who was shouting and hitting him on the head with a book. An elderly woman, distributing candles to the visitors entering this famous church on Red Square, saw the puzzled look on my face and explained in heavily-accented English, "He was stealing. He is a bad boy."

A few days later, as a part of the same tour, I was standing with a group of Americans in the Eastern Orthodox cathedral that holds the famous Black Madonna icon in Czestochowa, Poland. We had just entered the vast sanctuary which tradition regards with great reverence in Eastern Orthodoxy (some believe that great healings have taken place there), when someone began to sing the hymn, "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today!" Gradually, the rest of us joined in. Suddenly, we were interrupted by an Orthodox priest who began shouting at us, "Stop! Stop! Please Stop!"

Sitting with our group in the hotel later that night, I told those around me how unsettled I was. My visits to two very holy sites in Easter Europe/Russia had been tarnished by shouting church officials, stealing, and ugly confrontation – obnoxious reminders of the human condition.

"The nations are in an uproar," (Psalm 46:6), the Psalmist declares. He really doesn't have to tell us that – we hear the daily news - many people die tragically in Gaza and Ukraine each day, extremists slaughtering people in South Sudan, car accidents claiming lives. Things haven't changed much.

The season of Lent comes as God's invitation to look squarely at the darkness within us and within the world around us and discover the light shining there- "the light shines in the darkness," John declares, "and the darkness has not overcome it."

Later that same week, after returning to the US from our tour, we went to church - a service at Central Lutheran in Minneapolis. ... continued on next page

The pastor, a friend of my family, said, "It's painful to live and work here in the downtown, watching all the struggle of those on the street, the homeless, the poor, the immigrants. But it just may be that those experiences make the promises of God look and sound even more clear and powerful." Important words that have stayed with me ever since.

Lent is about the darkness of the human heart and the light of God's promises, as it leads us to the risen Christ. Let's make this journey together this Lent.


Lord Jesus, we ask these things of you this day and always. Amen.

WHAT IS LENT?

The Season Lent starts with Ash Wednesday on Wednesday, 2/14. As early as the mid-fourth century, Christians have observed a time of preparation before the Easter celebration. The Lenten season begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts for 40 days. The forty days of Lent recall the 40-day fast of Jesus in the wilderness after his baptism (Matthew 4:2, Luke 4:1-2) and Moses' 40 day fast on Mount Sinai (Exodus 34:28). It is a time of simplicity and preparation. The principal themes of Lent include penitence; baptismal renewal; prayer; fasting; service; and confession of sin rooted in the promise of God that comes through the cross of Christ.

GOOD SHEPHERD'S 2024 LENTEN SEASON



Theme: "Unconditional? The Call of Jesus to Radical Forgiveness"

Utilizing the book by the same title, author Brian Zahnd writes, "Forgiveness lies at the heart of the Christian faith. Whatever else may be said about Christian people, it must be said that we are a people who believe in the forgiveness of sins... we believe in the forgiveness of sins as surely as we believe in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As we grow in our faith, it is vital we become aware that we are called to be those who extend forgiveness to others, thus making the world a more forgiving place. For if Christianity isn't about forgiveness, it's about nothing at all." This will guide our lenten Wednesday services.



GOOD SHEPHERD AND LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

What is a Land Acknowledgement?

A Land Acknowledgment, identifying Indigenous inhabitants of a particular place, is a public witness that honors mother earth and the Indigenous people who took care of the land. It is not just words but an action—we develop and practice it because we want to shift how non-native people hear or understand the presence of Indigenous people. It is the first step of a learning process that promotes truth and healing and, for a brief moment, whether spoken or published, causes us to think about Indigenous people and the lands we live on (from Vance Blackfox, ELCA director for Indigenous ministries and tribal relations; www.livinglutheran.org/2021/11/48330/).

Why should Good Shepherd work on this?

Developing a Land Acknowledgement will help us move more deeply into the ELCA's Truth and Healing Movement which provides opportunities to learn the true history and current realities of Indigenous people. "It is these truths, truths that have been ignored by most for hundreds of years, that will bring healing for both Indigenous and non-Indigenous people" (elca.org/indigenous). From it we can begin to discern what God is calling us to do on behalf of our Indigenous siblings who carry the consequences of our history and take actions we feel we are called to do to promote truth and healing for all of us.

How will we do this?

Even though tribal nations are acknowledged in our Racial Justice Statement, we have more work to do to update it, learning more about the Indigenous people who took care of the land on which our congregation now worships; what happened to them, and where are their descendents today. Most of us have not grappled with the questions this raises: How do I face this? How do I deal with the feelings it raises? How does our faith guide us in difficult places like this? And because our nature at Good Shepherd is get to work, we will ask, "So now what? What can we do? How will we do it?"


Our work into this new territory will be led by the Land Acknowledgement Task Force appointed in December by Council: Anne Clausen, Linda Donoghue and Elizabeth Kaschins. They are ready and eager to help us get involved in this important initiative from the ELCA that grows out of the Gospel's call.

Erick is a Decorah native who graduated from Decorah High School and was baptized and confirmed at Good Shepherd. His maternal grandparents, John and Jean Bruemmer, were Charter Members of GS and Jean was the church secretary for many years. Erick graduated from Loras College in Dubuque and served in several banking positions before coming to Decorah Bank and Trust as a VP.
