YOUTH LENT PROJECT FOCUS ON MENTAL HEALTH: Funds from this year's project are going to mental health resources and awareness, specifically NAMI in NE lowa (National Alliance on Mental Illness). WORLD DAY OF PRAYER: First United Methodist Church will be hosting World Day of Prayer on Friday March 1 at 9 am. The theme is "I Beg You... Bear With One Another in Love." The program was written by a group of ecumenical Christian Palestinian women in response to the passage from Ephesians 4:1-7. We will reflect collectively on this theme from the context of suffering as Palestinian Christian women.

AMMPARO OPPORTUNITIES IN OUR COMMUNITY: Good Shepherd has a long history commitment to the newcomers in our community and currently works through the AMMPARO program of the ELCA to support asylum seekers locally. The ways you can support this ministry in an active manner include:

and vocacy opportunity for immigrant Rights: House File 2112 Please email our lowa House Representative, Michael Bergan (michael.bergan@legis.iowa.gov) and tell him this bill will harm innocent members of our statewide community. This ant-immigrant bill is designed to crack down on the smuggling of undocumented immigrants into lowa, and to prevent them from accessing public assistance programs. The bill is part of a wider push by Rebulicans to block undocumented immigrants from receiving taxpayer benefits – in spite of the fact that undocumented immigrants who are working are themselves paying taxes. The broad language of the bill could be interpreted to mean that anyone driving an immigrant to a doctor's appointment, a sporting event, or to get groceries, etc. could potentially be held liable for smuggling. Additionally, there is concern that this bill (along with two others being considered: HSB703 and HB2320) will heighten anti-immigrant sentiment in the state.
