### STOP! SPIRITUAL REFLECTION DURING LENT

Sometimes I wonder if the church should adopt a one-word mission statement: "Stop." Just getting people (including myself) to slow down and to reflect is what one might call an Audacious Goal! Our ministry programs and our worship at Good Shepherd Lutheran reflect this mission. Most of what we do involves an invitation to step back in this season of Lent and reflect.

For example, at this time of year we teach our Confirmation students and their parents that worship is more important than their normal Wednesday evening class time. So, we instead come and sing (or even just listen to) the Lenten Holden Evening Prayer, and then to also experience the theme of "Forgiveness" expressed in our messages and prayers. Whether it's on Wednesdays or Sundays, worshipping our Lord slows us down and bids us to quiet ourselves to hear God's words to us.

University of California San Francisco scientists have made some new discoveries. They found that when people have new experiences like exploring an unfamiliar area, their brains show new patterns of activity. But only when people take a break from their exploration are they able to process those patterns in a way that seems to create a persistent memory of the experience.

These same discoveries apply to how humans learn. Almost certainly, down time lets the brain go over events it has experienced, to solidify them, and then turn them into permanent long-term memories and learning," says Loren Frank, professor of physiology at the university. (NY Times, 8-2018)

I think most of us need reflection time to learn and grow. So often I wake up in the morning with my brain already in go-mode, my head spinning with things to do and get done. There is a pile on my desks at home and at work, and my e-mail inbox is bursting at its cyber seams.

In my head I know that pausing, and then reflecting and praying with God will bring strength and perspective to my day. Time after time I have experienced the truth of this, but it took me many years of crashing and burning to learn it and then make it a daily habit where I cannot live without it! (Although I will admit that I still fail occasionally!)

"In returning and rest you shall be saved; in quietness and in trust shall be your strength. Therefore, the Lord waits to be gracious to you..." says the prophet Isaiah (30:18) Do I believe it? Can I trust it?

A continued blessed and reflective season of Lent to you... remember to Stop!

#### Theme: "Unconditional? The Call of Jesus to Radical Forgiveness"

# MISSION ENDOWMENT FUND EPIC SCHOLARSHIP PARENT-STUDENT MEETING, MARCH 17

The MEF Committee is announcing a Parent-Student EPIC Scholarship Meeting on Sunday, March 17th at 11:00 a.m. The meeting will be held in the Gathering Space and is open to 2024 high school graduates as well as any member of the congregation interested in the Good Shepherd EPIC (Educational Partners in Covenant) ministry. Applications for the 2024-2025 academic year will be available.

The EPIC Scholarship ministry is funded by the congregation's Mission Endowment Fund and is available to any member of the congregation attending an ELCA college or university. Each year the MEF Committee is authorized to utilize 4% of the fund's total value to award scholarships. Currently the fund value is approximately \$125,000, which translates into 5 scholarships.

Because of the growing number of youth in our congregation, the fund is currently unable to meet the application requests of all eligible students. At the Annual Meeting on February 4th the congregation reinforced their support of this ministry by voting to provide a \$5000 budget line item to be used for EPIC scholarships if necessary. It is anticipated that up to nine or ten applications could be received for the upcoming academic year. If that many awards are issued, the needs for next year will even be greater since all applications will be from underclass students.

For many years the specfic responsibilities of the MEF Committee have been to maintain and manage the fund, accept applications, and award the scholarships. With the growing membership of the congregation, the committee has had to find ways to grow the fund. This past year a Three-Pronged Growth Program was developed to address this need. In the SHORT-TERM the committee has encouraged memorials and direct donations to the fund. In addition, fund raising events such as the Easter Breakfast have been held and more could be planned. In the MEDIUM-TERM the congregation has elected to establish a budget line item to assist the committee.

In the LONG-TERM, a plan has been developed to encourage members of the congregation to consider including the Good Shepherd Mission Endowment Fund in their estate planning; two families have done so, to date. As part of this plan, Erick Kephart, Decorah Bank & Trust Vice

President and Trust Officer, presented an Adult Forum at Good Shepherd on this topic on February 18th.

Should you wish to financially support the scholarships you can do so by placing a check made out to Good Shepherd with a designation of MEF on the memo line or arrange for an on-line transaction. Tristan or Erica will assist you if you choose to make a monthly automatic withdrawal to MEF; several members of the congregation currently do so.

First United Methodist Church will be hosting World Day of Prayer on Friday March 1. The theme is "I Beg You... Bear With One Another in Love" Ephesians 4:1-3. This program, written by a group of ecumenical Christian Palestinian women, calls us to bear with each other in love, despite all difficulties and oppression. Martha Monson Lowe will be our speaker and Palestinian handwork will also be available for purchase. All are welcome. A second presentation will be given March 2 at Big Canoe Lutheran Church.

Supplies for LWR Personal Care Kits and Baby Care Kits will be collected during March and April. Donations can be dropped off in the containers in the Gathering Space outside the Sanctuary. We have some supplies on hand. Gail has been busy shopping at the Depot for baby things. Items still needed are: new, dark-colored bath towels (between 20" x 40" and 52" x 27"); 4-5 ounce wrapped bars of soap, any brand; new adult-size toothbrushes in original packaging; new metal nail clippers; sleepers without feet; cloth diapers, flat fold; dark-colored hand towels. We will be assembling the kits in late April.

- All members of the call committee are voting members of the congregation (our congregation has a fair number of associate members who also have affiliations with other churches those folks are unfortunately not voting members of our congregation).
- Good Shepherd has a wealth of pastors and former pastors among our membership -- per church practice and recommendations, we let those folks off the hook!
- We took into consideration existing service and commitments at Good Shepherd -- including, but not limited to, also letting off the hook the members who served on the most recent call committee.

These guidelines were shaped by Pastor Amy, Pastor Dave, and recommendations from the synod. We are happy to have a committee in place, and to begin our work of calling a new pastor!

A word on the process going forward: As many of us are aware, calling a pastor in this time is not guaranteed to be a quick, easy, or even successful process. That said, Good Shepherd is healthy, vibrant congregation. We believe we will attract good candidates who want to serve in our midst. We may need to have patience as we work through the process to find those folks, but we have faith that we will ultimately find a wonderful pastor who is a good fit for our lively congregation.

As this process unfolds, the call committee will stay in good communication with the congregation. We will provide regular updates on our progress, and also ask the congregation for your input and ideas. Thank you for entrusting us with this important task -- and for all your prayers and support along the way.

# ACCOMPANY MIGRANT MINORS WITH PROTECTION, ADVOCACY, REPRESENTATION, AND OPPORTUNITIES

In Spanish, the word amparo means protection, refuge, or shelter. Since 2016, AMMPARO has been the holistic, whole church commitment by the ELCA as a church in the world to accompany migrant children and families today and in the future. In 2017, Good Shepherd Lutheran Church became an AMMPARO WELCOMING CONGREGATION, the first designated as such in the Northeastern Iowa Synod. The congregation's commitment to supporting migrants is long-standing, beginning with active assistance for refugees from WWII and southeast Asia in the 1970's.

Since 2017, our congregation has responded generously with financial gifts for medical, emergency and legal needs, and basic food supplies for newly arrived neighbors from Central America in cooperation with other community agencies. We have given rides statewide to medical and legal appointments, have translated in the schools and at medical appointments, and have donated furniture and bedding to help families that come with nothing but what they can carry. We have hosted and provided hospitality to quarterly free legal clinics in the fellowship hall. We have written Christmas cards to persons in immigration detention and have led fundraisers for legal, medical and emergency needs.

Several Good Shepherd members participate in the Immigration Working Group at the Peace and Justice Center and participate in other local immigration advocacy groups such as Path to Citizenship. Those most intimately involved in this ministry work regularly to ascertain needs and legal trends and then ask for your involvement as our area welcomes an increasing number of asylum seekers, especially from Central America.

#### The ways you can support this ministry in an active manner include:

  - Neighbors Helping Neighbors (a fund for immigration related emergencies such as covering rent after the loss of a job or a serious illness). This fund is housed at the UCC.

This month-long commemoration provides an opportunity for all of us to reflect on and recognize the pivotal role African Americans have played in shaping the fabric of American society, as well as their resilience in the face of adversity.

Respective to music that has shaped society, here are two playlists from Black musicians for you to enjoy:



Respective to Black individual resiliency, did you know that the first U.S. female firefighter was a Black woman? As an employee of a technology company that serves the fire service (and other public safety fields), I was delighted to learn about Molly Williams, who is recognized as the first U.S. female firefighter. *Reference*:

I serve on the BIPOC committee at my company and here is a little paragraph that I shared with my colleagues in honor of Black History Month.

Can you imagine how much strength and resiliency it would take to serve on an all-male fire crew? Especially as a Black woman in the early 1800s? During her time at Oceanus Engine Company #11 in lower Manhattan, Molly was simply called "Volunteer No. 11." Her service was noted particularly during the blizzard of 1818. Male firefighters were scarce due to a cholera outbreak but Williams took her place with the men on the drag ropes and pulled the pumper to the fire through the deep snow--at the age of 71.

### GOOD SHEPHERD IS ONE OF 6 NATIONAL WINNERS

IN INTERFAITH POWER AND LIGHT'S COOL CONGREGATIONS ANNUAL AWARD FOR LEADERSHIP AND SUSTAINABILITY

WASHINGTON, D.C., February, 2024 — Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Decorah, IA is one of the six national Interfaith Power & Light (IPL) 2024 Cool Congregations Challenge winners awarded a \$1000 prize. The annual contest accepts applications from religious congregations around the United States who are doing work to address climate change by reducing their carbon footprint as they create models of sustainability within their communities.

Good Shepherd Lutheran Church won the Energy Saver Award for entirely eliminating the use of fossil fuels in heating, cooling, lighting, and powering their buildings. They have converted their building to all-electric, with heat pumps to heat and cool their buildings, powered entirely by solar on their property, preventing 25 tons of carbon emissions annually.

"Good Shepherd Lutheran Church and the other national winning congregations are casting a vision for the kind of world in which they want to live, and then carrying out that vision with practical actions that make a real difference in creating lasting solutions to climate change," said Rev. Susan Hendershot, President of Interfaith Power & Light.

The Cool Congregations Challenge shows that people of faith are united by concerns about climate change and are taking action. The winners provide strong moral role models for their communities, and their activities have a ripple effect on people in their own homes, demonstrating that acting on climate is a moral issue.

"Iowa IPL congratulates Good Shepherd Lutheran Church on their well-deserved recognition for their work and commitment on prioritizing sustainability. Good Shepherd shows us all what is possible when people of faith come together and live into bold and just action on the climate crisis.
