BE STILL...AND SEEK GOD'S ANSWERS

Questions are foundational in our faith journey. It can be more comfortable to hop from platitude to platitude -things just seem clearer when we do. But Jesus was a question-asker. He did not shy away from doubt, nor from open-endedness or from searching.

In fact, Jesus told us to *ask, seek, knock!* It is the core practice of a dynamic, action-oriented faith experience. His parables were multi-layered and often had multiple meanings. What we glean from one story at 25, may be completely different from our understanding at 50. The good news is our insights are meant to be diverse, deeper, and revelatory.

So, now that we are in the season of Easter, give yourself an Easter present of a different sort...ask yourself some Easter questions!

- "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised..." ~Matthew 28:5-6
 - Fear filled the hearts of those who had loved Jesus. They found it difficult to believe the Easter message at first.
 - Question to reflect on: What keeps me from hearing truths that are being offered to me? What is my resistance?
- Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." ~John 21:12
 - Jesus invited the disciples to come and be nourished with food he had prepared.
 - Questions to reflect on: What food am I being offered for the nourishment of my spirit? What food do I accept; what food do I reject?
- "Why do you look for the living among the dead?" ~Luke 24:5
 - Questions to reflect on: Am I looking for life in the wrong places—in old issues or things of the past which I need to let go? Where am I looking for life? What do I understand LIFE to be?
- "Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him." ~Luke 24:31
 - All around me Easter is happening. God continues to reveal love, to extend invitation to growth, to offer me hope.
 - Questions to reflect on: How is God moving in my life? What revelation am I to understand? How will this change my life? In what new ways have my eyes been opened?

What is needed to ask tough questions? Time, courage and faith! —Do not be afraid. A blessed Easter Season,

EPIC SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE FOR 2024-25 ACADEMIC YEAR

Any member of the Good Shepherd Congregation is eligible to apply for an EPIC (Educational Partners in Covenant) Scholarship if they are attending an ELCA college or university. Applications for the 2024-2025 academic year are now available from the church office and online under the "Giving - MEF" page. They must be completed and returned by May 1st.

Good Shepherd scholarships are in the amount of \$1000 each and are typically matched by the participating college or university. This year there are five members of the congregation receiving the Good Shepherd scholarship; Ava Holland (Luther), Mara Holland (Gustavus), Nathan Larson (Wartburg), Annalise Skrade (Concordia-Moorhead) and Daniel Skrade (Concordia-Moorhead).

There will be 5 members of the congregation graduating from high school this May and it is anticipated that many of them will be considering attending ELCA colleges or universities. Four of the five members currently receiving the scholarship this year are underclass students and will be returning next year.

AGAIN, to be considered for next year applications must be returned to the church office by May 1st.

RACIAL JUSTICE ARTICLE: BEING WILLING TO TRY

During the first weekend of March, I traveled to Minneapolis to attend the triennial gathering of the European Descent Lutheran Association for Racial Justice. It's one of six ethnic-specific associations of the ELCA. (Note: To clarify the organization's purpose, the assembly voted to rename it the ELCA Association of White Lutherans for Racial Justice.)

I didn't know much about this group before I went. The racial justice team shared information about the event, and I volunteered to go. It sounded like a good place to learn and connect with others, in order to inform our work at Good Shepherd. And it was! At the meeting's closing session, we reflected on a word or two about how we were feeling. My words were "excited and encouraged." We also were asked to name our next step, and mine is just this: Writing about it for our church newsletter.

My attitude to working for racial justice is that I don't know exactly how to go about it. I do know that racism and white supremacy are great injustices deeply embedded in the church and in society, and that they stand in opposition to the way of God. These are problems of an overwhelming scope and scale. I come with an attitude of willingness to learn and to act as God leads me.

At the assembly, I felt welcomed and affirmed. As I showed up, people started conversations with me. They were also eager to connect and encourage and exchange ideas. The meeting was framed as a weekend of worship. After the opening worship, we answered a few questions to make word clouds. One of the questions was, "What is your anti-racist superpower?" I knew this question was coming — we had been asked to reflect on it before the conference — but I have no idea of what anti-racist superpower I could possibly possess. So I wrote, "being willing to try." My phrase was shown on the screen at the front of the room among all of the other people's answers. I was sitting near one of the association's board members, and I heard them say, "I love that: 'being willing to try."

So, my anti-racist superpower is an acceptable start. And it was an attitude that I also found welcomed among the community of George Floyd Square, whom we got to visit on Saturday. George Floyd Square is the south Minneapolis corner where George Floyd was killed on May 25, 2020, which has since been named and claimed by the people of that community. *continued on next page*

George's aunt, Angela Harrelson, and five other community leaders shared with us how racial violence affects their families and neighborhoods. I was impressed to learn that in the aftermath of Floyd's death, a community movement started that continues to this day. We heard, for example, from two women, Jenny Leenay and Kia Bible, who respectively created the People's Closet, a free clothing exchange in a bus shelter, and 612 MASH, a non-profit medical organization. Other community members I met that day identified themselves as the Tourist Interrupter and the Gatekeeper, who help to preserve the grassroots memorial as a place of respect, peace, and engagement. Together, the community developed 24 demands for justice. They continue to meet with each other twice daily to organize around community needs. As pilgrimage guides for the George Floyd Global Memorial, they share these experiences and their own life stories with visitors like us white Lutherans.

Although George Floyd Square is a somber place of violent death, the community has created a place of hope and empowerment at that place. While visiting the square, I listened to Georgio Wright, one of our tour leaders, tell us that his brother, Imez, was also killed at this corner. But, Georgio said, his involvement in the community has changed his life. The square has become for him a place where he finds energy, determination and peace.

Thinking about George Floyd Square, I hear echoes of what Christians see in the Cross. Isn't it interesting that a church named for Calvary (the Latin name for the hill where Jesus died) is located only a block away from the square? Calvary hosted the assembly for the day at George Floyd Square. This Lutheran church joined its neighbors in the community and has transformed its property into affordable housing, sharing its sacred space to meet its community's needs. (You can read about this work in the book *Ashes to Action: Finding Myself at the Intersection of the Minneapolis Uprising* by Shari Seifert, who just stepped down as president of EDLARJ.)

After the tour and an energetic parade back to Calvary led by the Solidarity Brass Band, Kia encouraged us to reflect on what we had seen, heard, and felt. They all encouraged us (and, at times, admonished us) to listen, see, and engage without imposing our own prejudices on the place.

"We already have a Savior," said Jenny. "We don't need other saviors. We need resources and opportunities. We need people who want to make a friend, to know our names. People who want to have a conversation."
